SDSU University Senate Resolution Condemning Gender-Based Violence and Supporting the Rights of Women and Other Vulnerable People

January 24, 2023

WHEREAS, the SDSU University Senate expresses grave concern about the [failure of the legal systems](#) in our city, state and nation to defend the bodily autonomy and rights of girls, women, transgender and all other people who have been or will be [sexually assaulted](#); and

WHEREAS, the Senate condemns the [San Diego County District attorney's office \(December 7\) decision to not file charges](#) against the former SDSU football players who allegedly sexually assaulted a 17-year old high school student on October 17, 2021; and

WHEREAS, the Senate questions the ability of [Title IX](#), as it is currently structured, to effect any real change in the dynamics and issues in our community that make it possible for gender-based violence to occur repeatedly without consequence, and make our campus unsafe for girls, women, transgender or other people who are vulnerable to sexual assault; and

WHEREAS, As this country [rolls back the legislation](#) that protects the rights of women and other vulnerable groups in this country, the SDSU University Senate reinforces our commitment to shared governance and the creation of a safe, welcoming campus environment for women and other marginalized individuals.

RESOLVED, that the SDSU University Senate supports the establishment of a Gender-Based Violence Task Force with the following goals: to develop a set of critical goals and to advise SDSU leadership in the development of a Gender-Based Violence Center and other practices devoted to effect real and lasting change on this campus and in our communities in order to create a safe, welcoming environment for those who are vulnerable to sexual assault and to address proactively the behaviors of those who would perpetrate sexual assault.

Subject: [REVISED] Request to clarify the Senate and elected membership of the PBAC committee.

ACTION: The Chair of the PBAC Committee moves that the Senate adopt the following changes to the Senate policy file.

President's Budget Advisory Committee (PBAC)

1.0 Membership: ~~The Vice President for Business and Financial Affairs chairs the committee, which meets regularly at the call of the Chair.~~

1.1. Voting Members (15)

- 1.1.1. Administration-appointed members include: Vice President for Business and Financial Affairs (co-chair), Senior Vice President for Academic Affairs (Provost; co-chair), Vice President of Student Affairs and Campus Diversity (Chief Diversity Officer), Vice President for Research and Information, Vice President for University Relations and Development, Vice President for Information Technology (Chief Information Officers), and the President's Chief of Staff.
- 1.1.2. Student-appointed members include: President of Associated Students, and one additional student representative identified by Associated Students.
- 1.1.3. Senate-appointed members include: Senate Chair (ex officio), or designee; Chair of the Committee for University Resources and Planning (ex officio), three elected faculty members, and one elected non-MPP staff member.
 - 1.1.3.1. ~~Eligibility: The four elected representatives on PBAC shall be tenured and probationary faculty members or non-MPP staff.~~ There shall be no more than one faculty representative from any of the following: College of Arts and Letters, College of Engineering, College of Professional Studies and Fine Arts, Fowler College of Business, College of Education, College of Health and Human Services, College of Sciences, SDSU Imperial Valley, and the Library. ~~Three of the elected representatives shall be tenured and probationary faculty members, and one shall be a non-MPP staff member.~~

1.2. Non-Voting Members (10)

- 1.2.1. Budget Area Representatives: Chief Financial Officer of the Campanile Foundation, AVP for Academic Affairs Financial Operations, AVP for Student Affairs and Campus Diversity Financial Operations, AVP for Business and Financial Affairs Financial Operations, Director of Information Technology Finance and Administration.
- 1.2.2. Staff Attendees: Chief Financial Officer SDSU Research Foundation, Senior AVP for Administration, Director of Budget and Finance, Special Assistant to the Vice President of Business and Financial Affairs.
- 1.2.3. Senate Attendees: Senate Treasurer.
- 1.3. The committee co-chairs shall share the committee membership roster annually in September, or as changes

occur, with the Senate officers and the Chair of the Committees for Committees and Elections

2.0 Procedure for Electing Senate Representatives to PBAC¹

~~Eligibility: The four elected representatives on PBAC shall be tenured and probationary faculty members or non-MPP staff. There shall be no more than one representative from any of the following: College of Arts and Letters, College of Engineering, College of Professional Studies and Fine Arts, Fowler College of Business, College of Education, College of Health and Human Services, College of Sciences, SDSU Imperial Valley, and the Library. Three of the elected representatives shall be tenured and probationary faculty members, and one shall be a non-MPP staff member.~~

2.1. Nominations ~~and Elections~~:

- 2.1.1. The ~~Senate~~ Committee on Committees and Elections Chair shall announce vacancies and make a call for nominations. The Staff Affairs Committee Chair shall announce vacancies and make a call for nominations to all non-MPP staff.
- 2.1.2. Calls for nominations shall go out no later than the second week of February for terms that begin the following academic year.
- 2.1.3. The call for nominations shall include the following statement: "For these positions, it is desirable for nominees to have experience with and understanding of complex budgets. Elected representatives are expected to make decisions based on the overall academic mission of the university, and not to advocate for their respective academic or bargaining units."
- 2.1.4. Nominations shall be made by a ~~tenured and probationary~~ faculty member or non-MPP staff member with the approval of the nominee. No self-nominations are allowed.
- 2.1.5. Nominees shall write a short statement, no longer than 250 words, addressing their qualifications for the position. The statement shall be distributed to the Senate in advance ~~and summarized on the Senate floor on the day~~ of the election.

2.2. Elections:

- 2.2.1. Faculty representatives shall be elected by the full Senate in an election managed by the Committee on Committees and Elections, per the procedures outlined in the Bylaws, no later than the end of March for terms that begin the following academic year.
- 2.2.2. The staff representative shall be elected by the Staff Affairs Committee no later than the end of March for terms that begin the following academic year.
- 2.2.3. Elections may be completed during a Senate session, or via a secure electronic balloting process ahead of a Senate session as long as the Chair of the Committee for Committees and Election makes a formal announcement regarding the election results during the Senate meeting.

2.3. Terms

- 2.3.1. The election shall be for a three-year term, ~~except for terms that begin in the Fall of 2020.~~
- 2.3.2. Elected representatives who go on leave for any part of the academic year forfeit the remainder of their term, creating a vacancy that shall be filled by regular procedure.

¹ Exceptional Procedure for Academic Year 2019-2020. All 2019-2020 interim appointments shall end at the conclusion of the academic year. The Chairs of the Senate and Staff Affairs Committee shall send out a call for nominations for all four vacancies no later than the second week of March 2020, and the election shall be held during the Senate/Staff Affairs Committee's April 2020 meeting. In order to stagger terms of the elected representatives, the length of terms beginning in the Fall of 2020 shall be determined by lot after the election. One of the elected representatives shall serve a one-year term, one shall serve a two-year term, and two shall serve three-year terms. Subsequently all terms shall be three years.

2.3.3. Upon the completion of their term, representatives may run for re-election but shall serve no more than nine consecutive years.

~~2.4. Exceptional Procedure for Academic Year 2019-2020~~

~~2.4.1. All 2019-2020 interim appointments shall end at the conclusion of the academic year.~~

~~2.4.2. The Chairs of the Senate and Staff Affairs Committee shall send out a call for nominations for all four vacancies no later than the second week of March 2020, and the election shall be held during the Senate/Staff Affairs Committee's April 2020 meeting.~~

~~2.4.3. In order to stagger terms of the elected representatives, the length of terms beginning in the Fall of 2020 shall be determined by lot after the election. One of the elected representatives shall serve a one-year term, one shall serve a two-year term, and two shall serve three-year terms. Subsequently all terms shall be three years.~~

3.0 Function: The President's Budget Advisory Committee (PBAC) meets regularly at the call of the chair(s) to review the university budget and makes recommendations to the President regarding budget proposals.

Rationale: Working with Senate Officers, the PBAC Committee agrees that the lack of clarity in the elected membership of the PBAC Committee has caused confusion. This action and update of the Policy File will ensure the membership in practice matches the policy file, which will in turn ensure confusion about who sits on the committee and how they are appointed remains clear to all as it will be outlined in the policy file.

Subject: Review of membership and electorate in light of update to bylaws 1. Allow contingent SSP-AR and librarians to serve. Discussion with staff affairs on how non-represented employees were added in the current policy file language.

The CBL moves that the Senate adopt the following changes to the Senate policy file (Constitution) for a 2nd reading (majority vote).

4.0 Membership and Electorate

4.1 Elected Members

4.1.1. ~~Professors~~ Tenured and Probationary Faculty

4.1.1.1. The electorate shall consist of all tenured and probationary members of the faculty, as defined in Bylaws 1.1.1, representing each of the following constituencies: College of Arts and Letters, Fowler College of Business, College of Education, College of Engineering, College of Health and Human Services, College of Professional Studies and Fine Arts, College of Sciences, Imperial Valley Campus, Library, and Student Service Professionals - Academically Related (SSP-AR) .

4.1.1.2. Each of the constituencies outlined above shall elect the number of Senators equivalent to nine percent (9%), rounded up to the nearest integer, of its tenured and probationary full time equivalent faculty positions. This method of apportionment shall always yield at least one elected Senator for each constituency.

~~4.1.1.1 Tenured and Probationary Faculty Professors elected as members of the Senate shall be tenured and probationary faculty as defined in the Bylaws~~

~~4.1.1.2 Professor Senators shall be apportioned annually as follows: each major academic unit (as defined in the Bylaws) shall elect the number of Senators equivalent to nine percent (9%), rounded up to the nearest integer, of the tenured/tenure track full time equivalent faculty positions~~

~~(FTEF) assigned to that unit. This method of apportionment shall always yield at least one Senator for each major academic unit.~~

4.1.1.3 The term of office for ~~Professor~~ **Tenured and Probationary Faculty** Senators shall be three Senate calendar years. A ~~Professor~~ **Tenured and Probationary Faculty** Senator shall serve no more than two consecutive complete terms. Service for a partial term and for terms served on the Academic Senate of The California State University shall not be included in this calculation. So far as feasible, Senate terms shall be arranged so that only one-third of the membership is elected annually in the spring.

4.1.14. Delegates from this university to the Academic Senate of The California State University shall be considered elected members of the Senate.

~~4.1.15. The electorate shall consist of all tenured and probationary faculty, as defined in the Bylaws~~

4.1.2. ~~Lecturers:~~ **Contingent Faculty (10). There shall be ten elected Contingent Faculty Senators. At least eight of them shall be lecturers, with no more than two representing a single college or equivalent unit. No more than one shall be a Contingent Student Services Professionals-Academic Related (SSP-AR) faculty and no more than one shall be an Assistant Librarian. The electorate shall consist of all contingent faculty members as defined in Bylaws 1.1.2.**

~~There shall be 8 elected lecturer senators, with no more than two representing a single College or SDSU Imperial Valley. The electorate shall consist of all lecturers.~~

4.1.3. Coaches **(1)**. There shall be one elected coach senator. The electorate shall consist of all coaches.

Also please not that the term “Professor Senator” has to be replaced everywhere by “Tenured and Probationary Faculty” editorial.

(This applies to Bylaws 6 and 7 and Constitution 2.6 among others)

Rationale:

This action item makes 2 substantial changes and cleans up language:

The substantial changes are

- 1) Two seats for contingent faculty are added. This makes seats available for contingent SSP-AR faculty and assistant librarians. Both groups are currently not able to serve. In 21-22 there were 32 contingent SSP-AR faculty on campus (of which 26 in Counseling and Psychological Services).

Other changes clarify issues.

- “Tenured and Probationary Faculty” are no longer referred to as “Professors”
- The units that have “Tenured and Probationary Faculty” representation equivalent to 9% of their membership are listed here en the term “major academic unit” is not longer mentioned.
- Language is aligned with that adopted by the Senate in Bylaws 1.0 May 2022, e.g. contingent faculty

Subject: Request to change Intercollegiate Athletics Council composition and description in the University Senate Policy File, University Policies: Committees and Councils.

Please see all proposed changes tracked below, with comments indicating the change and justification for change. All changes were reviewed and approved by the Intercollegiate Athletics Council at our meeting on 10/4/22.

Intercollegiate Athletics Council

1.0 **Jurisdiction:** The Intercollegiate Athletics Council (IAC) shall be an all-university advisory body to the President on varsity intercollegiate athletics. The IAC shall be responsible for recommendations to the President about the entire intercollegiate athletic program as offered by the San Diego State University Department of Intercollegiate Athletics. The IAC shall represent the segments of the university community interested in athletics at San Diego State University. The Chair of the IAC shall make periodic reports to the Senate.

2.0 **Duration:** The IAC shall function with periodic review by the President.

3.0 **Membership**

3.1 **19 Voting Members**

- a) Nine faculty: *five* appointed by the Senate and *four* appointed by the President (which includes the Faculty Athletic Representative and may include up to one college dean with faculty retreat rights);
- b) Vice President for Business and Financial Affairs;
- c) Vice President for Student Affairs **and Campus Diversity** or designee;
- d) **Diversity Officer for Student Affairs and Campus Diversity, who shall sit on the Gender, Diversity, Equity and Well-Being Committee;**
- e) Vice President for University Relations and Development or designee;
- f) Two students: one appointed by the President of Associated Students and one appointed by the Student-Athlete Advisory Council;
- g) **Member** of the Aztec Club;
- h) One alumnus appointed by the Director of the Alumni Association;
- i) One community member appointed by the President;
- j) One staff member nominated by the Staff Affairs Committee and confirmed by the Senate.

3.2 **One of the five Senate-appointed faculty members will be appointed by the Senate to serve as the University representative to the Coalition on**

The IAC shall have no administrative or executive capacity.

The Lecturer Senators listed above move that the Senate charter a Lecturer Affairs Committee, which will be a Senate Standing Committee, as follows:

Lecturer Affairs Committee

- 1.0 Membership (12):** Lecturer serving on the Faculty Affairs Committee, or designee; a Lecturer from each of the following nine (9) academic colleges/areas (College of Arts & Letters, College of Education, College of Engineering, College of Health & Human, College of Professional Studies and Fine Arts, College of Sciences, Faculty Advancement & Student Success, Fowler College of Business and Imperial Valley); and two additional at-large Lecturers from across the university.
- 1.1. At least two (2) members of the committee shall be current Senators.
 - 1.2. Members must be on full academic year appointments, or have a reasonable expectation that they will be appointed to work during both the fall and spring semesters.
 - 1.3. Members shall serve no more than nine consecutive years on the committee, which is equivalent to three (3) consecutive 3-year terms.
 - 1.3.1. A member's term length is determined by their contract type. Members who have single year appointments serve single year terms. Members who have 3-year appointments serve 3-year terms.
 - 1.3. A chair shall be elected by members in March of each year to serve for the next academic year.
- 2.0 Functions:** The committee (a) shall meet regularly to identify, discuss and organize around campus issues that impact the Lecturer constituency; (b) develop new policy or make recommendations for revisions to existing policy related to Lecturer affairs; (c) advocacy for the inclusion of the Lecturer constituency as part of the decision making and governance on campus; (d) organize the Senate caucus for Lecturer senators; (e) regular engagement with the Lecturer constituency; (f) other functions that may be required in service of the Lecturer constituency. Known topics that impact the Lecturer constituency include, but are not limited to:
- a. Service and work completed outside of the scope of contracted teaching.
 - b. Inclusion in department meetings, collaborations, and decision-making processes.
 - c. Training.
 - d. Lecturer planning and hiring at the university and departmental levels.
 - e. Collecting Lecturer feedback (e.g. surveys) for collaborative decision making, etc.
 - f. Perform a periodic assessment of Lecturer seats on Senate committees to ensure Lecturer interests are represented on key groups and regarding key issues.
 - g. Make recommendations to the Committee on Committees and Elections (CCE) and/or

Senate leadership regarding Lecturer participation on Senate committees.

3.0 The Chair (or designee) shall report the business of the committee to the Senate.

Rationale

Over the past thirty years, since the inception of the SDSU Academic Senate, the Senate has evolved to be more inclusive of the myriad stakeholders in the university ecosystem. Now, our Academic Senate is a University Senate, and offers representation and membership to more than just faculty. There are staff senators, student representatives, non-represented employees, and more.

In the last thirty years, SDSU has also come to rely more heavily on the teaching expertise of Lecturers. According to ASIR, for the fall 2022 semester, SDSU employs 1,269 Lecturers, 186 tenure-track faculty, and 644 tenured faculty¹. At this moment in time, Lecturers comprise about 60% of all faculty employed at SDSU. Additionally, ASIR reports that In the Fall of 2022, of the 6,687 sections taught at main campus, 2,975 (44%) were taught by Tenured/Tenure-Track faculty, 3,263 (49%) were taught by Lecturer/Adjunct Faculty, and 448 (6.5%) were taught by TAs (with one course taught by an instructor of unknown classification)?

Lecturers as a constituency share a unique set of experiences as members of the SDSU community. A Lecturer Affairs Committee can provide the opportunity to build a more robust Lecturer community, helping Lecturers engage more collaboratively with campus administrators and colleagues. Chartering this Committee will have a positive impact on the lives and experiences of Lecturers, and can further the cause of shared governance on our campus.

As the flagship CSU, we want to ensure that we are leading the way when it comes to inclusion for the Lecturer constituency. As it stands, we are already behind the movement, as other CSU campuses have already chartered committees and councils related to Lecturer affairs, like CSUSM² (standing committee), Chico State University³, and others.

ACTION: The Academic Policy and Planning Committee (AP&P) moves that the Senate adopt the following changes to University Policies: Academics, Absence from Class, Student, 3.0 Absence for Religious Observances:

UNIVERSITY POLICIES: Academics

Absence from Class, Student

3.0 Absence for Religious Observances

- 3.1. ~~By the end of the second week of classes, students should notify the instructors of affected courses of planned absences for religious observances.~~ **The university is committed to supporting students who wish to practice their religious beliefs.¹ Students anticipating an absence or missed coursework due to religious observances should provide reasonable advance notice to their instructor for the purposes of identifying and developing an appropriate accommodation.²**
- 3.2. Instructors shall reasonably accommodate students who notify them in advance of planned absences for religious observances.

Rationale:

Students report that the current requirement to notify faculty by the end of the second week of classes about a religious observance is a barrier to receiving accommodations. The current deadline falls during the add/drop period, when students are still finalizing their schedules and may not be able to enroll in a section that better fits their schedule.

California State Education Code, which supersedes individual campus policies, does not require students to request a religious accommodation by the second week of classes (section 89320):

“The Trustees of the California State University shall require each state university, in administering any test or examination, to permit any student who is eligible to undergo the test or examination to do so, without penalty, at a time when that activity would not violate the student’s religious creed. This requirement shall not apply in the event that administering the test or examination at an alternate time would impose an undue hardship which could not reasonably have been avoided. In any court proceeding in

which the existence of an undue hardship which could not reasonably have been avoided is an issue, the burden of proof shall be upon the institution.”

This proposal seeks to align our campus policy with the California Ed Code. The revised policy removes barriers, supports student success, and encourages faculty to be as flexible as possible.

Please review Section 4.5 and other relevant sections of the SDSU University Senate Bylaws. Review the purpose and function of the ASCSU, the historical diversity of SDSU ASCSU senators, and SDSU DEI values. Make recommendations regarding inclusive election policies and criteria.

The CBL moves that the Senate adopt the following changes to Senate policy file (Bylaws) [for a 1st reading. \(2/3 vote needed\)](#)

4.5. Elections to the Academic Senate of The California State University (ASCSU)

- 4.5.1. The Committee on Committees and Elections (CCE) shall devise procedures for and shall supervise and administer all elections of representatives from San Diego State University to the Academic Senate of The California State University ~~(CSU Academic Senate)~~ (ASCSU). **Elections shall be held each spring by May 1 for an ASCSU senator to start the upcoming academic year.**
- 4.5.2. ~~Only tenured and probationary faculty members, as defined in Section 1.2 of these Bylaws, are eligible for election to the Academic Senate.~~
- The following are eligible for election to the ASCSU.**
- 4.5.2.1 **Tenured and Probationary-faculty members as defined in Bylaws 1.1.**
- 4.5.2.2 **Contingent faculty members on a multi-year contract.**
- 4.5.3 **At any point in time, not more than one of the ASCSU senators may be a contingent faculty. When one of the ASCSU senators is a contingent faculty, only “Tenured and Probationary” faculty are eligible for election that year.**
- 4.5.4. The electorate shall consist of all ~~tenured and probationary faculty members~~ **faculty as defined in Bylaws 1.1.**
- 4.5.5. **The term of office shall be three calendar years. Upon the completion of their term, representatives may run for re-election but shall serve no more than two consecutive 3-year terms.**
- 4.5.6. The Committee on Committees and Elections shall resolve any dubious or disputed

eligibility for election to the Academic Senate or membership in the electorate.

4.5.6. The election shall be conducted in a manner similar to the provisions of Sec. 4.25.

4.5.7. In the event that an elected member is unable to attend a meeting of the ASCSU, the Senate shall name a substitute for that meeting. The Committee on Committees and Elections shall appoint the runner-up from the last regular yearly election of the ASCSU senator to attend and vote at that meeting. If that person is not available, the Chair of the Senate shall appoint a substitute.

~~Each academic senator, in consultation with the Chair of the Senate, shall designate someone to serve as a substitute in the Academic Senate whenever a substitute is permitted under the Constitution of that body. The Chair of the Senate or designee shall serve as the substitute, should there be no other appointment.~~

4.5.8. In the event that an elected member will be absent for one semester or longer a replacement shall be elected by all faculty for the duration of the absence or the end of the term as outlined under 4.5.2, 4.5.3, and 4.5.4 above.

~~Should an academic senator position become vacant, the Committee on Committees and Elections may opt to fill the remainder of that position's term via an election held concurrently with the next regular election of an academic senator position for a full term.~~

Rationale

The proposed policy brings our SDSU policy in compliance with ASCSU policy.

The ASCSU represents the faculty on the campus, including lecturers. The number of ASCSU senators from each campus is based on FTEF. The ASCSU constitution states that all members of the “faculty” are eligible to **vote**. According to Eadie at this moment **“SDSU could be considered out of compliance to ASCSU requirements by allowing only tenured and probationary faculty to vote, should our current procedure ever be challenged”**.

As to who is allowed to **serve** as delegate to the ASCSU, all those defined as “faculty” are allowed to serve. Each campus shall determine which members of the campus community are considered to be faculty. The faculty of the campus may, at its discretion, establish additional requirements for service as a campus representative.

CBL met with lecturers and ASCSU senators to discuss this. They also sought input from DEI and SEC. The recommendation above is based on this discussion and feedback. In particular one seat is open to all contingent faculty.

The percentage minorities are higher among lecturers than TT faculty, hence opening up a seat to a lecturer could increase the diversity of the ASCSU.

CBL also proposes a new rule on substitutes to bring this section in compliance with the ASCSU rule: “In the event that an elected representative is unable to attend a meeting of the Academic Senate, the senate of that campus may name a substitute who shall have the right to attend and vote at that meeting.” (4.5.7)

4.5.8 updates the policy for permanent or sabbatical replacements (or similar). Again we follow ASCSU policy: “In the event that an elected member will be absent for one or more semesters or quarters, the faculty of the affected campus shall replace this member in such manner as may be determined by the faculty of that campus.”

The TTPC moves that the Senate adopt the following changes to Senate policy file:
Tenure-Track Planning.

Tenure-Track Planning

History of Tenure

When colleges and universities were initially established, they were designed for the elite, specifically elite Euroamerica males (Wilder, 2013), and faculty were from that same privileged group. All faculty were hired as contingent faculty through the early twentieth century. During the 1920-40s, and as middle-class men had access to higher education and as labor movements grew more and more successful across the country, tenure was established in order to recruit and retain faculty. It was initially established as a right, with faculty achieving it after being employed for a certain length of time. This changed after the civil rights movement, which opened more access to diverse people and women in colleges and universities. In the 1970s tenure shifted to being a privilege that was conferred upon specific individuals and complex structures were established that served to maintain the status quo of white male privilege. Currently, the numbers of tenured and tenure-track faculty are dwindling across the country, in part because of these privileges, the changing demographics of the country, and shifting access and equity issues. Higher education continues to become more elite, even though the majority of courses on campus are being taught by contingent full- and part-time lecturers and teaching assistants. The American Association of University Professors (AAUP) affirms the importance of tenure in its [1940 Statement of Principles on Academic Freedom and Tenure](#), and affirms the need to increase tenure-stream hiring while also improving conditions for contingent faculty ([The Annual Report on the Economic Status of the Profession, 2020-21](#)).

1.0 The university shall adopt a specific planning goal to establish the proportion of probationary and tenured faculty to 87.5 percent of the total of the university's full-time equivalent faculty (FTEF) and no more than 25 percent of the total instruction within any department, should be provided by faculty with non-tenure-track appointments. ~~positions dedicated to probationary and tenured faculty and lecturers~~. Each college shall formally

examine its philosophy, mission, pedagogies, and diversity plans in relation to this proportion.

2.0 To meet this goal the university shall need to (a) refill the tenure-track positions that become vacant through retirements, resignations, terminations, and deaths, and (b) strive to maintain the ~~75 to 25~~ percent proportion articulated above in 1.0.

2.1 With the growth of contingent faculty nationally, which disproportionately and adversely impacts faculty of color and female-identified faculty, the university has an ethical responsibility to create pathways for contingent faculty positions to convert into tenure-track positions whenever possible. There are multiple possible pathways, including prioritizing contingent faculty candidates in tenure-track searches, converting contingent faculty to tenure-track lines, and ensuring that the university does not exceed the recommended total percentage of contingent faculty appointments in any department.

2.2 As an additional equity measure, the university should pursue longer contracts for contingent faculty whenever possible and as allowed by the collective bargaining agreement. Barriers to contract renewal should be eliminated, and the renewal process should be fair, equitable, and transparent for all contingent faculty.

3.0 This tenure-track renewal initiative shall become the university's highest fiscal priority.

4.0 The allocation of tenure-track positions shall be tied to programmatic planning by departments, schools, programs, and colleges, aligned with BIE criteria. DEI must be a factor of consideration.

5.0 After appropriate consultation with the Tenure-Track Planning Committee, the Provost shall determine and communicate to the university a policy concerning the allocation of new and vacated tenure-track positions in a timely manner that will align with the competitive nature of tenure-track searches across the country.

Re: Report on transit, sustainability, and student success

As requested, the members of the Committee on Sustainability (Senate Sustainability Committee) reviewed the report dated March 7, 2022 produced by Dr. Rosalio Cedillo on the intersections between sustainable transportation, student success, and economic disparities at SDSU. This response provides our assessment of the issue, feedback on the study, as well as several recommendations to mitigate the issue.

Assessment of the issue

The report describes a comparison of the average commuting times to SDSU campus for students in the South Bay area of San Diego either by car or by public transit. The results demonstrate that commuting from South Bay to campus by public transit takes approximately 81 to 96 minutes, whereas it only takes approximately 25 minutes by car. This is a concern because transportation is a strong predictor of student success and college completion among Latinx students (many of whom live in the South Bay area). A long and difficult commute may take away from academic participation and significantly impede students' ability to complete their degrees at SDSU.

Feedback on the study

The Senate Sustainability Committee notes that the results of the study described in the report could have been more precise with a different method of setting the times in Google Maps, and with more specific arrival destinations. For instance, the times entered in Google Maps could have been set as "*arrive by*" 8 am or 9 am instead of "*depart at*" 8 am. If a student leaves home at 8 am and it takes 90+ minutes to get to campus, they are still at the transit station at 9:30 am or later and they need to get to their class (as part of the [last mile problem](#)). Similarly, when comparing the commute time with a car, the circling in the parking lot (which is also environmentally disadvantageous) and distance to their first class needs to be calculated as well. Campus is too large to consider arrival *somewhere on campus* as the end point of their commute. Parking demands increase substantially by 9 am until 4:30 pm. The committee asks if the means (average commuting times) would have been different if the study calculated "arrive by 8:45 am" for both modes of transportation to more accurately mirror peoples' lived experiences.

Recommendations

The Committee on Sustainability notes that the large discrepancy in commuting times by transit versus car stems from the inefficiency of San Diego's public transit systems. San Diego County absolutely needs to invest in more efficient and reliable public transportation options that get students (as well as university employees) to campus in a shorter time, and with a smaller carbon footprint. Our first and most important recommendation is for **SDSU to be more actively involved in advocating for a more holistic and centralized transit system** (e.g., with SANDAG). Part of this can be expanding the Fast Bus System in San Diego, as described in the [Fast Bus Report](#). Relatedly, we recommend that **SDSU obtains feedback from Parking and Transportation as well as Associated students** as they have ongoing conversations with MTS and also involving Student Life and Leadership and their work with commuter students.

Second, the results of this report suggest that [microsites](#) may potentially have a bigger future for SDSU. We therefore recommend that **SDSU explores the possibility of establishing more campus satellite sites in the South Bay**. SDSU has already set a precedent for that by relocating the [School of Television, Theater, and Film to Chula Vista](#). However, just like with online-only programs, microsites have the downfall of not allowing students to participate in the broader campus activities, which are also often linked to student success (tutoring, in-person advising, the library, other resources). Therefore, a thorough assessment of the pros and cons of such microsites is necessary.

Third, similar to the private student residential complexes in the College Area advertising "free" shuttles to campus, **the committee believes there could be demand for a South Bay to SDSU shuttle route** similar to the [Imperial Valley Shuttle](#). Again, this would mirror lived experiences (having to be at the shuttle stop at 7:30 am to make it in time for a 9 am class). **The cost should be covered by existing tuition fees**. On that note, the committee also recommends that **SDSU waives MTS student pass fees for first-generation students or students coming from certain zip codes/school districts, or even all students** (as included in their tuition). Eliminating transit costs for students would likely boost enrollment, which means more tuition, so it would be a win-win. Relatedly, the committee raises the question whether students can pay for their [MTS bus passes](#) using financial aid or scholarships?

Fourth, the committee recommends **further expanding upon carpool rideshare systems among commuter students** to alleviate these pain points as well. For instance, we propose the development of a mobile phone app for SDSU students, staff, and faculty to commute to campus through ridesharing.

Lastly, SDSU could provide **more attainable housing closer to campus** as another solution, but this is rarely a viable option for students (e.g., living with parents is still cheaper, they may work full time in South County). For some students, however, it could alleviate the commuting issue.

In summary, our committee recognizes the adverse impact of long commuting times on student success as well as environmental sustainability, and therefore recommends the university to take prompt action in order to achieve the above ascribed initiatives and to fully support all of our students, especially our most precarious re-enrollment campaign students.

The November 3-4, 2022 ASCSU plenary meeting was held online.

JEDI Training

On Thursday, November 3, 2022, 8AM-10AM the ASCSU Justice, Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion (JEDI) Committee held training for ASCSU senators.

Trustee Sabalius

The CSU budget request to the Legislature was set at the September Board of Trustees' (BoT) meeting to give more time for advocacy (normally the CSU budget ask is not decided until November).

At its next meeting, the CSU BoT will discuss the first reading of a resolution requiring a 4th year of quantitative reasoning for admission to the CSU.

Jolene Koester, Interim CSU Chancellor (Time Certain: Thursday 11AM)

Clarified the role of CSU Trustees (in their visits to the ASCSU, trustees are typically asked too many questions of detail that is outside of their purview).

Enrollment: The CSU is facing an unprecedented situation: the system will be 7 percent under-enrolled for 2022-23 (in terms of FTES). In effect, the CSU has received funding for a target it will not be able to meet; CSU universities and auxiliaries have already created budgets around a goal that will not be met. Seven CSU campuses that have lost considerable enrollment over several years (most of them are in the north, including SFSU, Sonoma, and Chico). The presidents have been asked to do what they can to increase enrollment in Spring. The CSU has generated a set of potential steps to take to improve the enrollment situation. The Chancellor's Office is going to have to become an enrollment manager (no details given as to what that implies precisely); the CSU has created a strategic work group on enrollment management. All that we know at this point is that any answers they come up with are not likely to be one-size-fits-all. Community College enrollment numbers are down as well, which means that the CSU is losing CCC transfers. Retention is also a problem. But first-time freshmen numbers are up, although not enough to balance the shortfall in the short term. Robust discussion followed.

Trustees Leslie Gilbert-Lurie, Jose Antonio Vargas, Jean P. Firstenberg, and Jolene Koester, Interim CSU Chancellor (Time Certain: Thursday 11:30AM)

Q&A with senators on various issues facing the CSU.

A constrained fiscal environment is coming; state tax revenues are down.

Charles Toombs, CFA President – CFA Liaison Report (Time Approximate: Thursday 2:30PM)

CFA is pushing to increase the number of counselors with tenure on campuses.

Dixie Samaniego, CSSA Vice President of Systemwide Affairs -- CSSA Liaison Report (Time Approximate: Thursday 3PM)

Expressed concerns with the cost of course materials. CSSA is supporting an initiative to make most CSU majors zero-cost majors.

Leora Freedman, Acting Vice Chancellor for Human Resources (Time Certain: Friday 12:30PM)

VC Freedman provided a CSU Systemwide Title IX & DHR (Discrimination, Harassment, and Retaliation) Assessment Update and discussed the on-going Cozen O'Connor (the law firm currently conducting Title IX & DHR assessment on CSU campuses) team visits to campuses.

The CSU Systemwide Title IX and DHR Assessment by Cozen O'Connor is designed to strengthen the CSU institutional culture by assessing current practices at the system-level (Chancellor's Office) and at each CSU Campus, and providing insights, recommendations, and resources to advance CSU's Title IX and DHR training, awareness, prevention, intervention, compliance, and support systems. The Cozen team visited 16 CSU campuses so far. SDSU's visit was November 1-3, 2022. They are seeking feedback from faculty, staff, students and administrators on how to report their findings. They will prepare a preliminary report that highlights what they did, what were the challenges, and make some preliminary recommendations.

Lyn Harper, Mercer – Senior Principal and Al Liddicoat, VP University Personnel and Chief Human Resources Officer, San Luis Obispo: Faculty Compensation Study Presentation (Time Certain: Friday 1PM)

Mercer representative introduced CSU Project team members and provided a Power Point overview on the project approach and updates about the project's planning and stages of the on-going faculty compensation study. They reviewed the project's strategic development; compensation market analysis and salary structure; pay compression, inversion and equity analysis; stakeholder analysis, communication and implementation; and their next steps, including stakeholder focus groups from November 4-10, that will be conducted using AI

technology: <https://www.calstate.edu/csu-system/faculty-staff/faculty-compensation-study/Pages/stakeholders-focus-group-sessions.aspx>.

All CSU faculty are invited to participate. No specific conclusions yet.

The ASCSU also heard from **Jerry Schutte – CSU-ERFSA Report** (Time Approximate: **Thursday 3:30PM**) and Sylvia Alva, Executive Vice Chancellor of Academic and Student Affairs (Time Certain: **Thursday 4PM**)

Resolutions

At the November 3-4, 2022 ASCSU plenary meeting, 11 resolutions were passed:

AS-3567-22/FGA CLARIFYING AB 927 IN THE EVENT OF AN INTERSEGMENTAL IMPASSE

Urges the Legislature to amend AB 927 by appending language to Section 78042 of the Education Code (i) (5) that shall read:

“The written agreement required between the objecting segment and the Chancellor of the California Community Colleges shall address, at a minimum, whether each of the elements of the original objection addressed in paragraph (4) has been resolved. The Community Colleges may not proceed to offer the proposed program(s) about which objections have been made unless or until the objecting segment ‘s concerns have addressed to the satisfaction of the objecting segment,”

and requests the Chancellor’s Office advocate for such an amendment with the Legislature.

AS-3568-22/FA THE ROLE OF FACULTY IN PROTECTING FAIR FACULTY WORKLOAD IN THE CSU

Encourages CSU faculty on all campuses to request and use reassigned units for which they are eligible, based on the Collective Bargaining Agreement (CBA) and campus policies and practices and discourages faculty from volunteering for work for which reassigned units are provided by their campus administration, recognizing that it is detrimental to the quality of education in the CSU, a violation of the Collective Bargaining Agreement, and a violation of the *Fair Labor Standards Act* to volunteer for one’s own job. Also, discourages faculty from working overload units for which they are not compensated or for which they are relinquishing compensation.

AS-3569-22/APEP ON THE INTERSEGMENTAL COMMITTEE OF ACADEMIC SENATES (ICAS) CAL-GETC PROPOSAL: ACTION

Urges the ASCSU to ADOPT or FAIL TO ADOPT the California General Education Transfer Curriculum (Cal-GETC) proposal recommended by ICAS for consideration at its June 1, 2022, meeting.

AS-3570-22/FA REQUESTING EXTENSION OF WSCUC AUTHORIZATION OF REMOTE TEACHING

Strongly urges the Chancellor's Office to seek from the WASC Senior College and University Commission authorization of remote teaching for the CSU system for the Spring 2023 academic term.

AS-3571-22/APEP ENGAGING INTERSEGMENTAL DISCUSSIONS REGARDING COLLEGE PREPARATORY COURSEWORK IN MATHEMATICS (AREA C)

Recommends to the CSU Math Council form an ad hoc committee consisting of faculty and, as appropriate, staff and administrators, to engage - in the 2022-23 Academic Year - with the appropriate leadership of the University of California (UC) and the California Community Colleges (CCC) to review recent changes to the UC Area C mathematics standards and the courses subsequently approved that validate or replace Common Core Algebra 2 or Integrated Mathematics III, and requests a report from the Math Council on progress made on this issue by May 1, 2023.

AS-3572-22/FA PROCLAIMING THE PERSONHOOD AND RIGHTS OF WOMEN

Proclaims that girls and women have personhood, that they are full and equal human beings, with rights equal to those of boys and men under the law, and that forcing girls and women into life-threatening pregnancy and childbirth violates their right to bodily autonomy, endangers their physical health, and violates their right to life.

AS-3573-22/AA TO ADOPT GENDER INCLUSIVE-LANGUAGE AND TITLES AT THE CALIFORNIA STATE UNIVERSITY

Recommends the adoption of gender-inclusive terms such as "first-year student" (or "first-time, first-year student") and "upper-level student," instead of gender-based terms such as "freshman" and "upperclassman" respectively in university records, materials, communications, and processes, and recommends that communications from the CSU, including from the system, CSU campuses, academic and other units adopt the use of gender-inclusive language.

AS-3574-22/FA REAFFIRMING THE ROLE OF CAMPUS SENATES IN THE CALIFORNIA STATE UNIVERSITY (CSU)

Affirms the role of campus Academic Senates in creating campus policies and procedures and their right to modify and create campus policies that are consistent with and which complement the Collective Bargaining Agreement, and that claims that campus Academic Senates may not create or address policies that include items bargained between the CSU and CFA are false and without any legal or other foundational basis. Urges the CSU Chancellor's Office to recognize the rights and responsibilities of campus Academic Senates and their vital role in shared governance, including creating and modifying policies that are consistent with and which complement the Collective Bargaining Agreement and urges campus Presidents to support the

role of campus Academic Senates, including their right to create and modify policies on items that are also addressed in the Collective Bargaining Agreement.

AS-3575-22/FA PROVISION OF FREE CONDOMS TO STUDENTS ON CALIFORNIA STATE UNIVERSITY (CSU) CAMPUSES

Recommends that each CSU campus provide free condoms to students on campus, as well as information about the use and effectiveness of condoms.

AS-3576-22/FA REQUEST FOR ONGOING ACCOMMODATIONS AND FLEXIBILITY IN THE TIME OF COVID-19

Acknowledges the ongoing impact of the COVID-19 pandemic and asks the Interim Chancellor to urge the campus presidents to be flexible, compassionate, and accommodating in responding to evolving conditions. Requests that students, faculty, and staff who are immunocompromised or have COVID-19 related medical exemptions be accommodated for remote instruction and employment, in consultation with their Department Chair or supervisor. Urges the Chancellor's office and campus Presidents to address the need for additional long-term sick leave support for COVID-19 infections and for long COVID and recommends that faculty, in consultation with their department chair, be allowed flexibility in determining the best course of action should a class be exposed to COVID-19, including adopting an alternative modality in order to continue class sessions, and that faculty, students, and staff be surveyed regarding the issues they faced, and continue to face, in returning to a hybridized campus following the COVID-19 lockdowns to determine what long-term changes to campus and system policies need to be put into place.

AS-3577-22/JEDI/FA SUPPORT FOR EVALUATING THE CSU COURSE EQUITY PORTAL

Supports the concept and implementation of a Course Equity Portal, where faculty members can see a snapshot of achievement gaps in their courses between Underrepresented (URM) students and students not from URM groups, female and male students, students who receive Pell Grants and those who do not, and first-generation students and those who are not first-generation within each of their courses. Urges the Senates of individual campuses selected to participate in the pilot study to work with the Course Equity Portal team to encourage individual faculty members to reflect on the portal, its design, and how the portal could effectively help faculty members eliminate achievement gaps in their own courses and to provide that information to the Course Equity Portal team via an anonymous survey.

Nine Resolutions Received First Reading

AS-3578-22/JEDI "Expansion of California State University (CSU) Independent Doctoral Degree Programs" (Waiver refused)

Urges the Board of Trustees and the Office of the Chancellor to initiate and support the process to establish independent doctoral degree pathways for the CSU in collaboration with elected and community partners from across California.

AS-3579-22/FGA “Funding Academic Senate CSU Summer Legislative Specialist SUMMER Advocacy Work”

Requests that the Chancellor’s Office provide funding for the work of the ASCSU Legislative Specialist in the form of a stipend equal to the salary that the faculty member would receive for a 3-unit Summer Course on their campus.

AS-3580-22/FA “Request for Increased Ventilation and Air Purification Infrastructure Across the California State University (CSU) System”

Urges that additional ventilation and air filtration improvements in our campus buildings be prioritized, including the installation of public air quality monitors and the publishing of building air exchange rates and that the Office of the Chancellor, California Faculty Association, and ASCSU lobby the California Legislature for additional funding to support clean indoor air throughout the CSU as a critical public health issue.

AS-3581-22/JEDI/FA “Adopting a Font Designed for Readability for California State University (CSU) Business”

Urges the ASCSU, the Chancellor’s Office, and CSU administration to adopt for its business the Atkinson Hyperlegible font, which was designed specifically for readability.

AS-3582-22/FA “In Solidarity with the Courageous Iranian Women and Girls, Abroad and Locally”

Calls for an immediate declaration by the CDSU of solidarity with the women, girls, students, and professors in Iran who are engaged in citizen manifestations and directs CSU campuses to document, publicize, and support the diverse programs focusing on Middle Eastern Studies and Peoples; asks the CSU to develop formal processes to assist Iran-based students and professors who seek refuge in the U.S.

AS-3583-22/EX “In Support of Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act (NAGPRA) Compliance in the California State University (CSU)”

Urges the CSU Office of the Chancellor to institute a moratorium on faculty research covered by [NAGPRA](#) and [CalNAGPRA](#), and on work that uses ancestral remains and objects of cultural patrimony until compliant stewardship is adapted on all CSU campuses.

AS-3584-22/FA “Establishing Timely Responses to Legislative Resolutions from Campus Senates”

Urges each campus senate to review its constitution and bylaws toward the goal of clarifying its legislative rights and responsibilities in such matters and to establish within its constitution or bylaws a timely deadline (not to exceed sixty days) for presidential responses to curricular and academic policy-related resolutions, beyond which such resolutions shall be considered enacted and in force. Also, urges that campus senate bylaws require that all presidential vetoes include a rationale that is reported to the senate and accessible to the campus community.

AS-3585-22/JEDI/FA/FGA “CSU Employee Justice Equity and Diversity Housing Assistance Program”

Urges the CSU system to implement a housing assistance program for all faculty and staff systemwide that is fair and inclusive in order to make homeownership attainable and conducive to long-term housing and employment stability.

AS-3586-22/JEDI/FA “Systemic Inclusion of Preferred Names and Pronouns within the California State University (CSU) System”

Urges the Office of the Chancellor to make preferred names and pronouns available to all people affiliated with the system, including but not limited to students, faculty, staff, and administration, within all applicable identifications, forms, systems, and technological applications utilized by the system and its affiliated foundations and other entities, where legally allowed. Urges all CSU campuses and their affiliated entities to implement similar access to preferred names and pronouns within all applicable identifications, forms, systems, and technological applications, where legally allowed. Urges the CSU system to develop and deploy training modules on the use of preferred pronouns and the issues that can arise when that doesn't happen.

RE: Report on sabbatical application practice feedback from Deans, Chairs, and Directors.

In December 2022, the Faculty Affairs Committee (FAC) solicited feedback from Deans and Chairs/Directors on current sabbatical application practices. Deans and Chairs/Directors were asked to provide responses to four questions/prompts:

1. Share insight from faculty in your unit about why such a low proportion of eligible faculty apply for sabbatical.
2. Share your thoughts on why faculty apply for 1 semester (Type A) vs. Difference in Pay Leave Full year sabbaticals (Type B).
3. When sabbatical applications are denied, what factors/reasons (if any) are offered to applicants?
4. Briefly share your college/department's application/review/approval/denial processes.

Responses were received from over 20 Deans/Chairs/Directors. We identified four themes that commonly appeared in responses to prompts 1-3.

Theme 1: Small number of awards available and/or given

This was the most common theme occurring across prompts 1-3. In fact, 12 out of 18 codeable responses to prompt 1 included this theme. Responses commonly included statements related to the few number of awards available and how highly competitive the process is, critically pointing out that the process is not competitive due to the review criteria but because of the small number of awards. Several of the respondents identified that sabbatical applications that had been denied were strong and that frustration levels are high with competitive applications being denied.

Theme 2: Inability to leave campus and/or separate from the needs of the University

This was the second most common theme. It can be further divided into two parts: one is a belief that sabbatical awardees are expected to leave campus/San Diego during the sabbatical period and the second is that University responsibilities prevent the applicant from taking a sabbatical. There also appears to be a bias in this theme toward applicants with school-age children who are less able to leave the region.

Theme 3: Applicant productivity

Another common response was that applicants were not applying or were being told that their applications were denied because they were not productive enough or do not possess external funding at the time of the sabbatical application.

Theme 4: Classist practices/finances

This theme most commonly appeared in responses to prompt 2 (12 of 16 codable responses). To quote one respondent "I also believe the sabbatical leave, as I understand the way it is structured currently, is based on classist logic where people who apply for a full year with half pay are regularly granted the leave while those who may not be able to afford that financially are left with applying for full pay for one semester and must "fight" against their own colleagues, so to speak."

Counter to the four themes summarized above, responses that there were no concerns in the application process were small, only appearing in 7 of 53 responses combined across prompts 1-3.

Responses to prompt 4 generally showed consistency in the structure of the review process: the school/department reviews applications and sends recommendations to the Director/Chair which sends recommendations to the College committee then Dean and University. Those responses that mentioned review criteria or guidelines reported greater inconsistency including lack of structured guidelines.

In summary, the small number of sabbaticals awarded seems to be the driving factor behind the alarmingly small number of eligible faculty applying for Type A sabbatical. This is unsurprising, considering the University Senate Resolution To Increase Number of Awarded Sabbatical Applications that was passed in November 22. What is not captured in the summary of these responses is the frustration felt at all levels with the current process. To quote one respondent, "Some colleagues have given up applying after a series of unsuccessful applications. Faculty essentially feel they need to "compete" with their colleagues to get a sabbatical, which is problematic on many levels." The findings from this initial survey of Deans/Chairs/Directors will serve to guide next steps by the Faculty Affairs Committee.

The Council met on Friday, December 2. Members in attendance were Brooks, Savage, Gallant, Pruitt-Lord, Mekany, Kim, Lauer, Martinez, Lopez, Hyman.

The Council received reports from AS and the Senior Assistant Dean for Student Success on Upper-Division advising, including updates on my.SDSU and Spring registration.

Discussion continued on the following items:

- A. [Referral on Student Grievance Procedure](#): AVP FASS met with AS University Council on December 1 to discuss potential procedural updates—students expressed support for a clarified process, potentially with a form for guidance and structure; next step—direct consultation with Student Grievance Committee.
- B. Update on transportation initiative: Undergrad Council reviewed [Community expression of support](#) for Rapid Route 625; councilmembers discussed importance of communications with various campus stakeholders as line advances: Latinx Resource Center, Sustainability Committee, Sweetwater District, AS Greenlove
- C. Update on Math Equity Initiative and CSU RFP: The Chancellors Office has made available one-time funding to support GI 2025 related initiatives, including a remake of “early start” programs. A broad range of campus partners are working to develop a proposal by mid-December to create supported pathways for preSTEM FTF, including support for first-year math courses.

The following new items were addressed:

- D. [Proposed update to curriculum guide language for service learning and community engagement courses](#): Professor Matt Savage introduced his work as the new director of the Office for Academic and Community Engagement, including his work (including consultation with CAA) to bring SDSU into alignment with CO requirements for identifying and denominating SL / CE courses via the CELT tool. He shared a proposed update to curriculum guide language to include process and criteria for denominating community engagement courses and asked for Council approval; Martinez moved; Lopez second; 8-0-1. This item will be referred to AP&P.
- E. [Leaves of Absence policies review to support reenrollment](#) (Michelle Lopez) [slides](#); Senior Assistant Dean Lopez presented information on SDSU and CSU leaves of absence policies. Council members discussed ways to ease the process of taking leave and related administrative barriers, including the new CSU “welcome back” application in lieu of reapplying competitively to the university.

Re: Student Feedback Surveys Fall 2022 Explorance Pilot

In December 2022, the campus introduced a new platform—Explorance Blue—for student feedback surveys / evaluations in connection with the campuswide transition to my.SDSU.

To accommodate faculty concerns that students complete surveys before seeing final grades, the surveys were administered for a seven-day period--December 13 – 20—via Canvas.

61,297 responses were recorded out of 177,051 surveys issued, for an overall response rate of 34.6%.

In the future, the final configuration of Explorance Blue will ensure that students complete surveys before receiving grades, allowing the campus to hold surveys open longer.

Because SDSU is adapting to this new platform, it will be optional for faculty to include Fall 2022 survey results in their periodic evaluations and performance reviews.

The January 19-20, 2023 ASCSU plenary meeting was held online.

Legislative Specialists Report [Sen. Schutte reporting]

The new California legislatures have been installed. Bills are now being posted and will continue through February 18th as that date is the statutory deadline. Most notable point being that the Governor has put forth his January budget reflecting the '23-'24 estimate of how the state's revenue and expense fair this year. The overall budget is \$297 billion with \$224 billion in general fund money but with a \$22.5 billion deficit. The CSU is continuing to experience the agreed upon compact increase of 5%. This amount represents a net increase of \$227 million, which, compared to our ask of \$530 million, represents an approximate \$284 million shortfall.

Trustee Sabalius Report

For the position of President at San José State University, the Board decided to hire Cynthia Teniente-Matson, currently President of Texas A&M University-San Antonio.

Members of Students for Quality Education protested some campuses' outsourcing of mental health counseling to an online provider located in Texas (Timey MD) as at previous Board meetings, many students demanded more full-time mental health counselors. Students demand that online mental health counseling should not supplant in-person counseling, but it can be used to expand after-hours care, increase the number of counseling sessions, provide flexibility from where to attend sessions, and it can address the diversity issue.

Interim Chancellor Koester announced that next year the CSU expects to be more than 25,000 full-time equivalent students or almost 7% below its funded enrollment target. "The good news is that first-time, first-year enrollment has increased to more than 65,000 students and is back to pre-pandemic numbers, but the number of new transfer students is down by almost 12,000 students from its peak in the fall of 2020."

For the first time since the inception of the Graduation Initiative 2025, the CSU has reported disaggregated data for underrepresented minority (URM) students with the following results in comparison to non-URM students:

**Trustee Lopez indicated that she would like to see a breakdown by gender in future reports, because there is also a gap in male graduation vs. female, especially among Pell Grant students.

The Five-Year Capital Plan totals over \$26.9 billion and is comprised of academic and self-support projects. The CSU is requesting one-time funds of \$1.3 billion from the state in 2023-2024 to address priority needs. As reported in September, nine campuses received state grant funds as a part of the HESHGP [Higher Education Student Housing Grant Program]. This approved grant funding for the CSU totals \$503 million and is being appropriated in the 2021-2022 and 2022-2023 California State Budgets as outlined in AB 190, the Higher Education Budget Trailer Bill.”

Sylvia Alva, Executive Vice Chancellor of Academic and Student Affairs Report (Time Certain: Thursday 9AM)

Update on California Community College (CCC) Baccalaureate Degree Programs ([AB 927](#)). In 2014, the Community Colleges would pilot Baccalaureate degree programs (15 in total). These 15 were implemented in Fall of 2016. The process for Baccalaureate programs was minimal (there was overlap between several of these programs). AB 927 makes these pilots permanent and authorizes the CCC to expand. First cycle of applications – 7 accepted without objection, 2 in which there were concerns, one remains contested for Fall of 2023. In general, when proposals are received, the CSU-CO has 30 days to conduct internal analysis, consult with Senate, and gather information from campuses whether it is a duplicate CSU program or not. The need for this review is important since the CCC has a regional perspective on need; while the CSUs is statewide – which is likely the reason/source for the 3 problematic degree programs proposed (2 with concerns and one contested). Senate recommends to the CO that there needs to be additional clarity around how to address issues of impasse between the CSU and CCC. Alva suggests that we define our own terms rather than look to the legislature to clear differences, since they would not have an extensive understanding of the CSU. The Senate expressed grave concern over the 30 day window; which is far, far too short to provide any sort of detailed response or review.

[AB 927 Public postsecondary education: community colleges: statewide baccalaureate degree program.\(2021-2022\).](#)

There is a need to develop a lower division GE pathway ([AB 928](#)). Concerns specifically center around the transfer process of Community College students to try to simplify and clarify the process for students. We are still in the process of trying to develop a clear pathway to transfer – one of the “sticking points” are the STEM fields. ICAS has proposed a “singular lower division general education pathway” (Cal-GETC) for transfer students for consideration by the three senates to meet the requirements of [AB 928 Student Transfer Achievement Reform Act of 2021: Associate Degree for Transfer Intersegmental Implementation Committee. \(2021-2022\)](#). There is also a concern raised about how this might impact our own enrollment in the CSU particularly at a time when there are enrollment challenges at many of our campuses.

Charles Toombs - CFA Liaison Report (Time Approximate: Thursday 10:30AM)

Preparing for bargaining workloads/salary/health and safety. CSU will be opening talks on benefits (suspect desire to raise parking fee). They expect to be at the negotiating table in May. They want to make sure that CFA gets as much input as possible going into these discussions. Priorities for workload changes will be solicited from the faculty in the coming months. In the past, the reasons for the low GSI was that the State has said it doesn't have the money or that it is below inflation. Questions was asked, “Will the CFA commit to a high GSI that makes up for these past shortfalls.” CFA is committed to a high GSI proposal.

Discussed anti-racism with CSU CO and there has been no response to any of these requests to address systemic anti-black racism. There has been some discussion with legislators to help address these concerns. Related to this was a question regarding the status of the Professors of practice proposal (which would impact both women faculty and faculty of color). CFA reports that there has been no movement on this proposal.

[Equity Conference](#) will be on Mar 8th- 11th. The Equity Conference 2023, “Co-conspiring for an Equitable Future: Building the Social Justice Bridge,” will focus on anti-Blackness and anti-indigeneity in the CSU.

Budget advocacy – there is concern that the CSU is not moving forward in the way that we (the CSU faculty) and that the state (citizens) want us to without adequate funding. Can we expect to see the CFA advocating for additional funds for the CSU? Short answer is “yes”. CFA strongly advocates for the full requested budget that has been requested by the CSU. However, the CSU has to prioritize where the funds that we receive is spent and that 1st priority must be faculty and staff salaries, so that our employees can simply live (and support their families) in this state.

Jolene Koester, Interim CSU Chancellor; Report (Time Certain: **Thursday 1PM**)

Enrollment in the CSU. We currently anticipate being 7% under enrolled. This is a situation that hasn't occurred before. We have 7 campuses in the system that have had a longer historical term of under enrollment. Communicated to all the university presidents about a realignment of funding based on enrollment. The state still expected the CSUs to meet its enrollment benchmarks under the compact. Money moving over a 3-year period to from under enrolled to those that are producing enrollment (7 currently under enrolled by 10% or more). These monies will be given to those campuses that are over enrolled to meet their enrollment needs. The plan is not an executive order and will have to be examined on a case-by-case basis.

Dixie Samaniego CSSA Liaison Report (Time Approximate: **Thursday 2:30PM**)

CSSA working at over coming barriers to student inclusion in campus conversations on campus/in the system – the biggest one being included in the conversations around current Title IX discussions/issues.

Total cost of attendance for students (barriers): top priorities being housing affordability and housing availability; being able to take courses (overall tuition); hidden costs of college (course materials/textbooks).

Dining Services quality appears to have declined over the years. There needs to be clear feedback opportunities to provide feedback on these services. (CSUDH has a model for potential feedback.)

Jerry Schutte CSU- Emeritus & Retired Faculty & Staff Association (ERFSA) Report (Time Approximate: Thursday 3PM)

The next meeting of the ERFSA Executive Committee will be held on January 25, 2023. Because of the continuing outbreaks of COVID variants, the Executive Committee meeting will be held again online. Among other Agenda items, the specific date for the April Statewide Council meeting will be determined then. Elections for statewide offices will be held at that April meeting. Many legislative matters continue to occupy our discussions. Continuing efforts to disconnect CalPERS from fossil fuel investments has made significant progress. We are making progress in making information available to those finding it difficult to decide concerning Long Term Care Insurance, given the lawsuit resolution that CalPERS suddenly backed out of last summer. As well EFRSA continues to investigate alternatives to affect the one-time compensation negotiated by CFA, yet denied for FERP and Retired Annuitants, for extraordinary work required to move classes to online status during the COVID.

Gina Maisto Smith - Chair; Leslie Gomez - Vice Chair, Institutional Response Group Report, Cozen O'Conner (Time Certain: Thursday 4:30PM)

Systemwide Title IX and DHR Assessment. The goal is to strengthen the CSU institutional culture: training, awareness, & prevention. They received a great deal of feedback and individual campus reports that will be shared with each campus (in Feb. * approximately). Each university will establish a working group to ensure that the recommendations are implemented.

Commendation was given to Cezar M. Ornatowski, Ph.D. for his outstanding service to the ASCSU Senate.

Resolutions

At the January 19-20, 2023 ASCSU plenary meeting, 9 resolutions were passed:

AS-3578-22/JEDI “Expansion of California State University (CSU) Independent Doctoral Degree Programs” [Second Reading]. **(Approved)**

Sustaining and fostering the health of California's economy requires training a skilled workforce with doctoral and professional degrees to meet the changing needs of society. It is paramount at this point in history that the CSU contributes to a high-quality workforce of scholars that is ethnically, racially, economically, and academically diverse. Therefore, “The ASCSU underscore the CSU’s strong commitment to advancing educational opportunities and training for Underrepresented Minority (URM) members of CA communities by significantly exceeding the University of California (UC) in the percentage of URM graduate student enrollments ready for professional graduate studies.” And, that “ASCSU requests that the Office of the Chancellor and Board of Trustees work with legislators to pursue the respective legislative modification of the California Education Code.”

AS-3579-22/FGA “Funding Summer Advocacy Work for the Position of Legislative Specialist of the Academic Senate CSU (ASCSU)” [Second Reading]. **(Approved)**

Funding support for the Position of Legislative Specialist of the Academic Senate CSU (ASCSU); ultimately, to ensure that ‘no one’ does work for free.

AS-3580-22/FA “Request for Increased Ventilation and Air Purification Infrastructure Across the California State University (CSU) System” [Second Reading]. **(Approved)**

The ASCSU urges that additional ventilation and air filtration improvements in our campus buildings be prioritized, including improvements in building ventilation and filtration systems to a MERV 13 standard or higher.

AS-3581-22/JEDI/FA “Adopting a Font Designed for Readability for California State University (CSU) Business” [Second Reading]. **(Approved)**

The ASCSU recognizes that visual impairment is a growing problem, and likely affects one or more members of the body directly; therefore, the ASCSU recommends the adoption for its business the Atkinson Hyperlegible font, which was designed specifically for readability. The font is available for free download from the Braille Institute: <https://brailleinstitute.org/freefont>.

AS-3582-22/FA “Solidarity with Iranian University Communities Protesting Violent Repression in response to the ‘Woman, Life, Freedom’ Movement” [Second Reading]. **(Approved)**

The ASCSU calls for the immediate declaration of solidarity with the people in Iran who are engaged in citizen manifestations and protest. Additionally, the ASCSU urges the CSU CO and CSU Campus Senates to support campuses in their support of diverse programs focusing on Middle Eastern Studies and Peoples which are important sites of community-building and education for all CSU students, faculty, and staff. Furthermore, the ASCSU shall encourage the development of formal processes to assist students and scholars in Iran who seek refuge in the U.S. because of the violent responses to their dissent in public spaces.

AS-3583-22/EX “In Support of Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act (NAGPRA) Compliance in the California State University (CSU)” [Second Reading]. **(Approved)**

The ASCSU affirms its support for the federal Native American Graves Protections and Repatriation Act (NAGPRA) and California Native American Graves Protections and Repatriation Act of 2001 (CalNAGPRA) compliance, as per AB 978, in the California State University (CSU). The ASCSU urges the CSU Office of the Chancellor to instate a moratorium on non-compliant faculty, student, and outside research as the CSU 14systems moves towards greater NAGPRA and CalNAGPRA compliance, and any work 15that uses ancestral human remains and cultural items including associated funerary 16objects, unassociated funerary objects, sacred objects, and objects of cultural 17patrimony until NAGPRA and CalNAGPRA compliance are achieved.

AS-3584-22/FA “Establishing Timely Responses to Campus Senate Resolutions and Policies” [Second Reading]. **(Approved)**

The ASCSU recognize and reaffirm the rights and responsibilities of CSU faculty via their campus senates to adopt legislative resolutions and policies establishing campus curriculum and academic policies.

AS-3585-22/JEDI/FA/FGA “CSU Employee Justice Equity and Diversity (JEDI) Housing Assistance Program” [Second Reading]. **(Approved)**

The ASCSU recognizes that many faculty unit employees and staff are priced-out of the housing market in California and its urban centers making it challenging to continue to reside in-state and locally and that marginalized people, including CSU faculty and staff of Color, are disproportionately denied home loans and when loans are extended -- interest rates tend to be higher, even when incomes are the same. Therefore, the ASCSU urge the CSU system to implement a housing assistance program for all faculty and staff systemwide that is fair and inclusive to make homeownership attainable and conducive to long-term housing and

employment stability. The ASCSU endorses mortgage assistance programs as tools to attract, retain, and support faculty and staff and their families.

AS-3586-22/JEDI/FA “Systemic Inclusion of Preferred Names and Pronouns within the California State University (CSU) System” [Second Reading]. **(Approved)**

The ASCSU urges the Office of the Chancellor (CO) to make preferred names and pronouns available to all people affiliated with the system, including but not limited to students, faculty, staff, and administration, within all applicable identifications, forms, systems, and technological applications utilized by the system and its affiliated foundations and other entities, where legally allowed. The ASCSU urges the CO to expand technology acquisition review processes for new and renewed digital systems (software, hardware, cloud-services, etc.) consider if the system allows for options to specify pronouns and preferred names and complies with Title IX and other regulation.
