Subject: ACTION: Priority Registration for Fowler Scholars

The Academic Policy and Planning Committee (AP&P) moves that the Senate approve the following:

Effective Fall 2025, SDSU Fowler Scholars will be eligible to receive priority registration.

Rationale:

At our September 24 meeting, AP&P received a referral from Mark Lindner, Director Fowler Scholars; Tam Lieu, Assistant Dean for Student Affairs & Center for Student Success; and Stefan Hyman, Associate Vice President of Enrollment Management, requesting that Fowler Scholars be added to the list of priority registration groups.

The Fowler Scholars are a small cohort (18 students) within the Fowler College of Business. They are SDSU students in good academic standing who are part of an intense “Ethical Business Leader” 4-year program. In addition to achieving academic success within the FCOB (minimum 3.0 cumulative GPA required), they are expected to learn additional skills outside of the normal academic setting. There are strict time commitments that limit their enrollment in other classes, particularly classes for their major and other required activities. Assigning these students priority registration would help them enroll in required classes that align with their schedule, while also easing the workload of FCOB administrative staff tasked with helping students build their schedules.

Per University Policies, priority registration, also referred to as early registration, is as follows:

1.0 Early Registration

1.1. Definitions and Principles

1.1.1. “Early registration” shall be defined as the opportunity to enter the registration process earlier than the normally scheduled registration time in order to adjust a class schedule to sanctioned time constraints

1.1.3. Early registration may be used to accommodate students of those groups whose services to the university or special circumstances require early registration. “Special circumstances” shall not include self-imposed time constraints.

2.0 Registration Sequence

2.3. Registration for a group below shall not begin before registration for an earlier group has received an opportunity. The registration sequence shall be as follows:

2.3.1. Fall and spring semesters

(a) Members of Priority Registration groups (continuing students)

Priority registration groups typically provide university service (measured in multiple ways) and have obligations with fixed times that require more leeway in choosing their schedules to avoid conflicts. The following groups receive priority registration:

- Students requiring disability-related accommodations
- Student-athletes
- ROTC students
- Students ambassadors
- Associated students leadership
- Community service officers
- Active duty military and veterans
- Guardian Scholars
- Students with dependent children under the age of 18
- California Promise students

For spring 2025, 11% of undergraduate students receive priority (day 1 registration) and another 1% receive priority in their student level (CA Promise). The percentage of undergraduate students receiving priority for Spring 2025 registration are:

- 1% Athletes
- 6% Student requiring accommodations through SDS
- 4% Other Priority Groups

11% of graduate students also receive priority.

AP&P approved the request to add Fowler Scholars to this list, but was careful to note that our vote should not be interpreted as a value statement about a single academic program. Moreover, it is not our intention to signal that one program has more value than any other program. Rather, our decision focused on supporting a group of students in making progress towards their degree.

AP&P noted the lack of a clear policy governing decisions about who should be included in a priority registration group. We intend to develop a broader policy to inform future similar requests.

The CBL moves that the Senate adopt the following changes to Senate policy file (Bylaws) [for a second reading. \(2/3 vote required\)](#)

13 Availability of Documents and Records

13.1 All agendas, minutes, **resolutions**, ~~reports, other attachments,~~ **annual university policy file versions**, and **presidential** action memos related to all regular and special Senate and **Senate Executive Committee meetings** ~~Senate Standing Committees~~ shall be posted on the sSenate website **accessible to the public for a minimum of two years**. ~~These posted documents shall be available to any member of the university community and other CSU senates and counsels upon request.~~

13.2 If a Senate meeting or any Senate-related event is recorded in whole or in part, the recording shall be available in a manner consistent with the California Public Records Act.

~~13.23~~ Confidential material shall be redacted or omitted from posted materials, but the agenda item in which confidential material is addressed shall be included in the table of contents and minutes.

13.4 Special Collections and University Archives will archive Senate agenda, minutes, resolutions, annual university policy file versions, and presidential action memos over two years old. These materials are publicly available in Special Collections & University Archives.

~~13.3~~**13.5** The current **University** policy file shall be **made available** ~~linked~~ on the sSenate website.

Rationale:

The Senate officers and University archivist came to an agreement about archiving materials. Most older documents that were as paper files in the office of the Senate Analyst are already uploaded and available by visiting the library. Recent materials that has been available on the Senate website in electronic form will be electronically available on the library website and reachable with one click.

Legally any recordings, if conducted have to be made publicly available. Note that at this moment only reports are recorded- as well as Senate-related events like the Senate Excellence in Teaching award presentation.

The CBL moves that the Senate adopt the following changes to Senate policy file (Constitution) [for a first reading](#).

Note that below we present three policy updates that will be voted on independently during the second reading (Constitution changes require a majority vote in Senate and a campus-wide vote, while Bylaw changes require a $\frac{2}{3}$ vote). These items are related hence presented here together for a first reading. The order presented here will not be the order of the vote, but this way is the most logical for a first presentation.

Constitution 5.0 Officers and Parliamentarian

5.1. The Chair of the Senate ~~who shall be the Chair of the Faculty~~, shall be an elected **faculty** senator, as defined by **Bylaws 1.1**. The Chair shall be annually elected to office by the majority of the elected senators. The Chair shall preside at all meetings of the Senate and may call special meetings of the Senate.

5.2. The Vice Chair of the Senate shall be an elected **faculty** senator, as defined by **Bylaws 1.1**. The Vice Chair shall be annually elected to office by the majority of the elected senators. The Vice Chair of the Senate shall preside as the Chair of the Senate should the Chair be unable to fulfill the duties of the office.

5.3. The Secretary of the Senate shall be an elected senator. The Secretary shall be annually elected to office by the majority of the elected senators. The Secretary (a) shall prepare the agenda for all Senate meetings and notify all senators of these meetings; (b) shall keep roll and report in a manner prescribed by the Bylaws when, in accordance with Senate policy, a seat has become vacant through repeated absence; (c) shall maintain a complete record of Senate meetings and prepare summaries of Senate minutes; (d) shall supervise the distribution of copies of Senate resolutions and decisions to appropriate persons; (e) and shall annually compile and publish an index of Senate actions.

5.4. The Treasurer of the Senate shall be an elected senator. The Treasurer shall be annually elected to the office by the majority of the elected senators. The Treasurer (a) shall administer the Senate annual operating budget and oversee the financial affairs of the Senate, which includes drafting an annual budget for approval by the Senate Executive Committee and final

proposed budget shall be presented to the Senate for approval by the end of the Spring semester; (b) report the state of the Senate budget at Senate and Senate Executive Committee meetings; and (c) shall act on the behalf of the Senate in meetings and serve on Senate committees that may require financial advice and oversight related to the Senate’s annual budget.

5.5. The Parliamentarian, who need not be a member of the Senate, shall be appointed annually **by the Senate Chair**, and shall advise the presiding officer on parliamentary issues.

~~5.6. Should the Vice Chair, Secretary or Treasurer of the Senate be unable to serve the full term for which he or she was elected, an election shall be held to choose a replacement for the period of absence.~~

Rationale:

The proposed language seeks to clarify who can serve in each office position in a direct matter. CBL believes that every elected Senator should be able to run for Secretary or Treasurer. CBL proposes that only faculty should serve as Senate Chair (and by default co-chair). CBL is divided about the question if Contingent Faculty should be allowed to run for (Vice)-Chair with a slight majority in favor. Those against argue that the Senate Chair is present at functions with administration, students, staff, community, donors, and so on and should be able to act with the confidence that tenure represents. Those in favor argue that if a contingent faculty (lecturer) is willing to put in the effort regardless of the power dynamics they should be allowed to run for Senate (Vice)-Chair.. The lecturer affairs committee supports the proposed policy. CBL members agreed that given the Senate chair position is almost a full-time job it will be nearly impossible for a staff member to do the work on top of their regular job. Hiring a temporary staff for the duration of the chairship is complicated. Staff affairs agree with this. CBL proposes to move the last sentence (5.6) to Bylaws 6 “Vacancies”.

Bylaws 6.0 Vacancies

6.4 Replacement of Senate Officers

6.4.1. Should the Chair be unable to serve the full term, the Vice Chair shall become the Chair and an election shall be held to choose a replacement Vice Chair.

6.4.2. Should the Vice Chair, Secretary or Treasurer of the Senate be unable to serve the full term, an election shall be held to choose a replacement.

Rationale:

This language is moved from Constitution 5 (Officers) to Bylaws 6 (Vacancies).

6.4.1 is added to make sure that the Vice-Chair position does not remain open when the Chair has to step down.

Bylaws 7.0 Meetings

Bylaws 7.1 Meetings of the Senate

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7.1.6. A faculty session of the Senate shall comprise only ~~Tenured and Probationary~~ Faculty senators, as defined by **Bylaws 1.1**. ~~the Constitution~~. Its function shall be to express the collective voice of the faculty. It may make determinations regarding any issue. Any member of the university community may attend a faculty session; however, only ~~Tenured and Probationary~~ Faculty senators may speak and vote.

7.1.6.1 A faculty session of the Senate shall be chaired by the Chair of the Senate.

(Remainder to be renumbered)

Rationale:

CBL proposes to cross “who shall be chair of the Faculty” from Constitution 5. Hence that has to be stated where the faculty session is defined. CBL proposes that all faculty are allowed in a faculty session.

ACTION: The Faculty Honors and Awards committee recommends that the Senate approve emeritus status for the following lecturers:

- **Molly Costello**, Lecturer in the Department of Geography; August 1, 2024, 22 years
- **Kathryn Palese**, Lecturer in the School of Art and Design; May 19, 2023, 29 years

Further, the FHAC recommends the Senate vote to approve emeritus status for:

- **John Abraham**, Professor of Mechanical Engineering; August 16, 2024, 9 years

Note that the emeritus request for Prof. Abraham was brought up at the March 2024 Senate meeting, but his 9 years of service did not meet the required minimum 10 years as stated in the Senate Policy File. Emeritus status was not approved because the candidate appeared to be ineligible. However, at the time Prof. Abraham submitted his notice to retire (December 2022) the requirement of 10 years of service was not in the Policy File. That requirement appeared in May 2023. Thus we request a reconsideration and a vote in light of this new information that came to the FHAC at the end of the spring semester.

Dear Professors Butler-Byrd and Welsh:

We are writing to ask that a vote on emeritus status for Professor John Abraham, Chair, Department of Mechanical Engineering, be held at the next Senate meeting this Fall 2024. We are submitting this request with additional contextual information for your consideration.

Professor Abraham joined the SDSU faculty as chair of Mechanical Engineering in Fall 2015. On December 1, 2022, he submitted his notice of intention to retire effective August 15, 2024 to Provost S. Hector Ochoa. At the time he submitted his notice of intention to retire, the Senate emeritus policy provided the following criteria for emeritus status:

Emeritus status may be conferred only upon faculty who have: (a) provided significant or sustained contribution in promoting the mission of the university, or (b) held employment with the California State University (CSU) system and who are eligible to activate their annuities from the CSU system.

Professor Abraham has shared that his “expectations and plans were guided” by this policy and by “precedence where emeritus status had been conferred with fewer than 10 years of service.”

Provost S. Hector Ochoa accepted Professor Abraham’s retirement on April 10, 2023.


On May 2, 2023, the Senate adopted criteria for conferral of emeritus faculty that stipulated a minimum ten years of service.

Because his retirement notice was submitted and accepted prior to the adoption of the emeritus policy ratified May 2, 2023, I ask that Professor Abraham's emeritus status be considered under the terms of the older policy in light of his "significant or sustained contribution in promotion the mission of the university."

At our September 24, 2024 meeting, the Academic Policy and Planning Committee (AP&P) discussed **Referral 23/24_01: Assess the Feasibility of an Online Campus-wide Policy File Catalog**:

Senate Officers request that the Academic Policy and Planning Committee, in collaboration with the Constitution and ByLaws Committee, conduct a review of all existing policy files across campus; identify where access to these files exist; identify which policy files need approval from the Senate; and determine whether a universal campus storage file and/or online access to the catalog of policies is needed (potentially within the library).

Based on the results of the committee's work, please submit a report to SEC to be shared as either an Information Item Memo (no policy change) or an Action Item Memo (process/policy change).

After considerable deliberation, AP&P came to the conclusion that conducting a comprehensive review of all policies is not feasible. Such a review would be exceedingly time consuming and incomplete, no matter how exhaustive our efforts. As we see it, there is no effective and efficient way to identify and track every existing policy.

As an alternative, the committee discussed the possibility of developing a general policy requiring all units (departments, schools, centers, colleges, divisions) to create and maintain their own public-facing policy file libraries. However, AP&P was concerned that such a requirement would be overly taxing on smaller units, who likely lack the personnel to collect, publish, and maintain policies on a regular basis.

While AP&P fully recognizes the critical need for transparent and accessible policies for the overall health of shared governance, we cannot move forward on this referral. The referral is too broad in scope to make it feasible, particularly given our current workload. We therefore return this referral to the Senate and recommend no further action be taken.

Subject: INFORMATION: Library Flood Update

On June 16th, there was a chilled water pipe burst on the first floor of the Library Addition. In sum, while the damage to the library was significant, primarily on the first floor and lower level of the Library Dome and Library Addition, the impact on print collections was surprisingly limited. While water was present in the Research Services area (which houses reference and media collection), as well as in collection storage areas on the lower level, only a small number of materials were damaged. None of the general collections were directly affected, and a small number of flat/file poster materials from special collections got wet without permanent damage. Where damage was more severe was to technology, especially in the Research Services area, in the library classrooms (LA76 and LA78), and to the flooring to our recently renovated compact storage area (LA40 and LA42).

By the start of the new academic year, most of the damaged technology in the Research Services area and in the classrooms had been replaced or was on order, and this was also true for the Digital Humanities Center. The most significant ongoing work is to the LA78 classroom (which should be fully restored by the end of the month) and to the flooring in compact storage, which is scheduled to complete replacement on or near September 20th, after which we will be able to begin returning materials to the shelves.

We are very grateful for the swift work of library faculty and staff, who reacted immediately to protect library users, collections, technology, and office space, as well as for the immediate assistance we received from colleagues in Academic Affairs, IT, and BFA. Recovering from an event of this scale in just a few weeks was truly a team effort! Any questions about the cause of the flood are beyond the purview of the library staff, and these questions should be referred to campus facilities in BFA.

Fred was a double alumnus of SDSU, active member of Beta Theta Pi fraternity (leading to the establishment of an endowment to support the Pierce Greek Life Center), supporter of the Stadium Excellence Fund where the upper suite level of Snapdragon Stadium is named The Pierce Pavilion. He was a member of the Athletics Directors Cabinet, Trustee Emeritus of the CSU System, past member of the SDSU Alumni Association and president-elect of The Campanile Foundation. He and his company were responsible for student housing on our campus he was a true champion of SDSU Mission Valley. He was also a two-time SDSU Distinguished Alumni Award winner (from the SDSU Alumni Association in 2020 and from the Fowler College of Business in 1990). 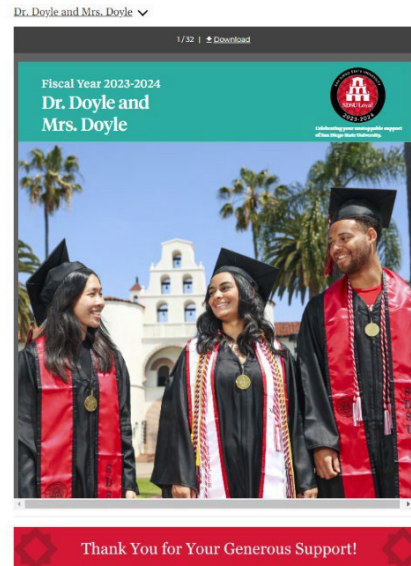
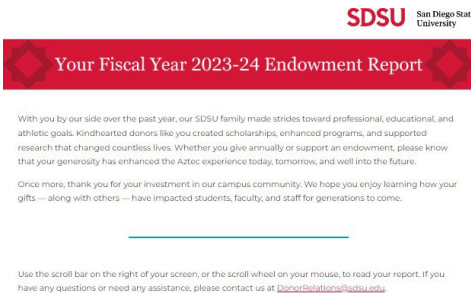

San Diego State University Senate: Quick Reference Guide for Actions & Voting

Robert's Rules of Order – Simplified

New Revised 12th Edition (2020)

Guiding Principles:

- Everyone has the right to participate in discussion if they wish, before anyone may speak a second time.
- Everyone has the right to know what is going on at all times. Only urgent matters may interrupt a speaker.
- Only one thing (motion) can be discussed at a time.

To protect decorum, members are not allowed to carry on discussion directly with one another (33.9, p. 434). Further, all remarks need to be addressed through the Chair: “Members of an assembly cannot address one another directly, but must address all remarks through the chair. If, while a member is speaking in debate, another member wishes to address a question to him—which the person speaking can permit or not as he chooses, but which is taken out of his time if he does—the member desiring to ask the question rises and addresses the chair, proceeding as explained under Request for Information” (43:22, p. 561 and 33:6–10, p. 433).

IMPORTANT NOTE: *During debate, during remarks by the presiding officer to the assembly, and during voting, no member should be permitted to disturb the assembly by whispering, walking across the floor, or in any other way (e.g. online chat).* The key words here are: disturb the assembly. The presiding officer should watch that such activity does not disturb the meeting or hamper the transaction of business. (43:28, p. 561).

A motion is the topic under discussion (e.g., “I move that we add a coffee break to this meeting”). After being recognized by the Chair, any member can introduce a motion when no other motion is on the table. A motion requires a second to be considered, *except agendas, minutes and items from committees which do not require a second*. If there is no second the matter is not considered. Each motion must be disposed of (passed, defeated, tabled, referred to committee, or postponed indefinitely).

How to do things:

- You want to **bring up a new idea** before the group.
After recognition by the Chair, present your motion. A second is required for the motion to go to the floor for discussion, or consideration.
- You want to **change some of the wording** in a motion under discussion.

After recognition by the Chair, move to amend by

- *adding words,*
 - *striking words or*
 - *striking and inserting words.*
-
- **You like the idea of a motion being discussed, but you need to reword it beyond simple word changes.** *Move to substitute your motion for the original motion. If it is seconded, discussion will continue on both motions and eventually the body will vote on which motion they prefer.*
 - **You want more study and/or investigation given to the idea being discussed.** *Move to refer to a committee. Try to be specific as to the charge to the committee.*
 - **You want more time personally to study the proposal being discussed.** *Move to postpone to a definite time or date.*
 - **You are tired of the current discussion.** *Move to limit debate to a set period of time or to a set number of speakers. Requires a 2/3rds vote.*
 - **You have heard enough discussion.** *Move to close the debate. Also referred to as calling the question. This cuts off discussion and brings the assembly to a vote on the pending question only. Requires a 2/3rds vote.*
 - **You want to postpone a motion until some later time.** *Move to table the motion. The motion may be taken from the table after 1 item of business has been conducted. If the motion is not taken from the table by the end of the next meeting, it is dead. To kill a motion at the time it is tabled requires a 2/3rds vote. A majority is required to table a motion without killing it.*
 - **You believe the discussion has drifted away from the agenda and want to bring it back.** *Say, "I call for orders of the day."*
 - **You want to take a short break.** *Move to recess for a set period of time.*
 - **You want to end the meeting.** *Move to adjourn.*
 - **You are unsure the Chair announced the results of a vote correctly.** *Without being recognized, call for a "division of the house." A roll call vote will then be taken.*

- You are **confused about a procedure being used and want clarification.** *Without recognition, call for "Point of Information" or "Point of Parliamentary Inquiry." The Chair will recognize you and ask you to state your question and will attempt to clarify the situation.*

You have **changed your mind about something that was voted on earlier in the meeting for which you were on the winning side.**

Move to reconsider. If the majority agrees, the motion comes back on the floor as though the vote had not occurred

- You want to **change an action voted on at an earlier meeting.** *Move to rescind. If previous written notice is given, a simple majority is required. If no notice is given, a 2/3rds vote is required.*

Unanimous Consent: *If a matter is considered relatively minor or opposition is not expected, a call for unanimous consent may be requested. If the request is made by others, the Chair will repeat the request and then pause for objections. If none are heard, the motion passes.*

You may INTERRUPT a speaker for these reasons only:

- to get information about business –point of information to get information about
- rules– parliamentary inquiry
- if you can't hear, safety reasons, comfort, etc. –question of privilege
- if you see a breach of the rules –point of order
- if you disagree with the president of the board's ruling –appeal
- if you disagree with a call for Unanimous Consent –object

Established SDSU Senate Practices:

Time for Debate: While Robert's Rules limits debate to two speeches per person, no longer than 10 minutes, it also suggests that time should vary to suit circumstances, SDSU Senate Practices have limited debate to no more than 2-3 minutes due to the large amount of business that needs to be covered at each meeting. The time, however, can be increased or diminished by a two-thirds vote. (43:1-18 p553-556)

Order of Agenda Items: SDSU Senate practice has been to prioritize important items of business before information and time certain agenda items.

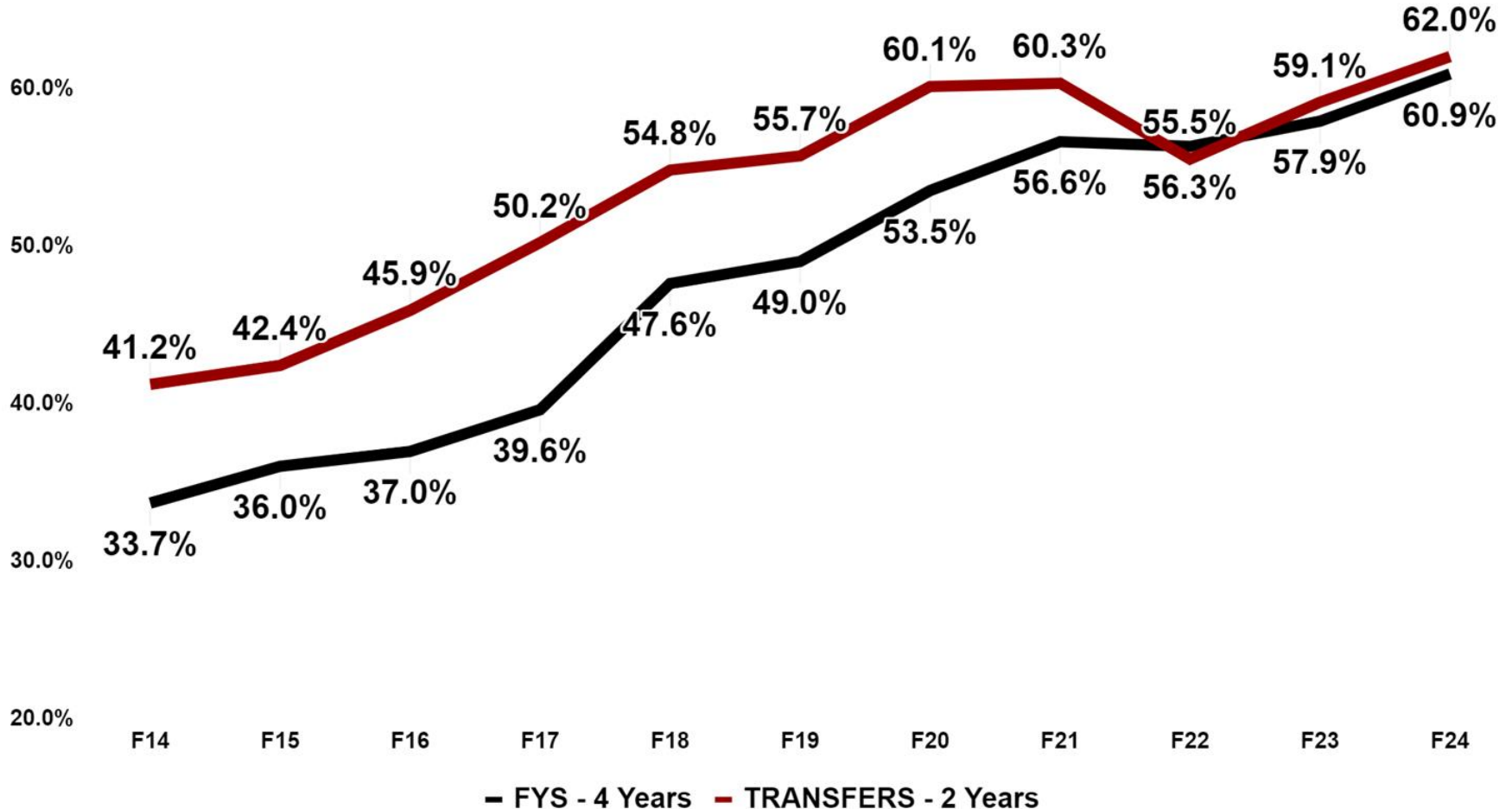
First-Year Students:

- SDSU four-year graduation rates reached an all-time high for first-time students.
- Nearly 61% of first-year students entering in Fall 2020 graduated within four years of matriculation.
- Rates rose for URM, Hispanic, First-Generation and Pell students.
- Commuter students had the largest gain, with rates increasing by 10 percentage points.

Transfer Students:

- Transfer students graduated at record levels after two years.
- Two-year graduation rates rose by nearly three points to 62%.
- All underrepresented students graduated at higher rates including URM, Pell, First-Generation, Black and LatinX transfer students compared to the prior cohort.

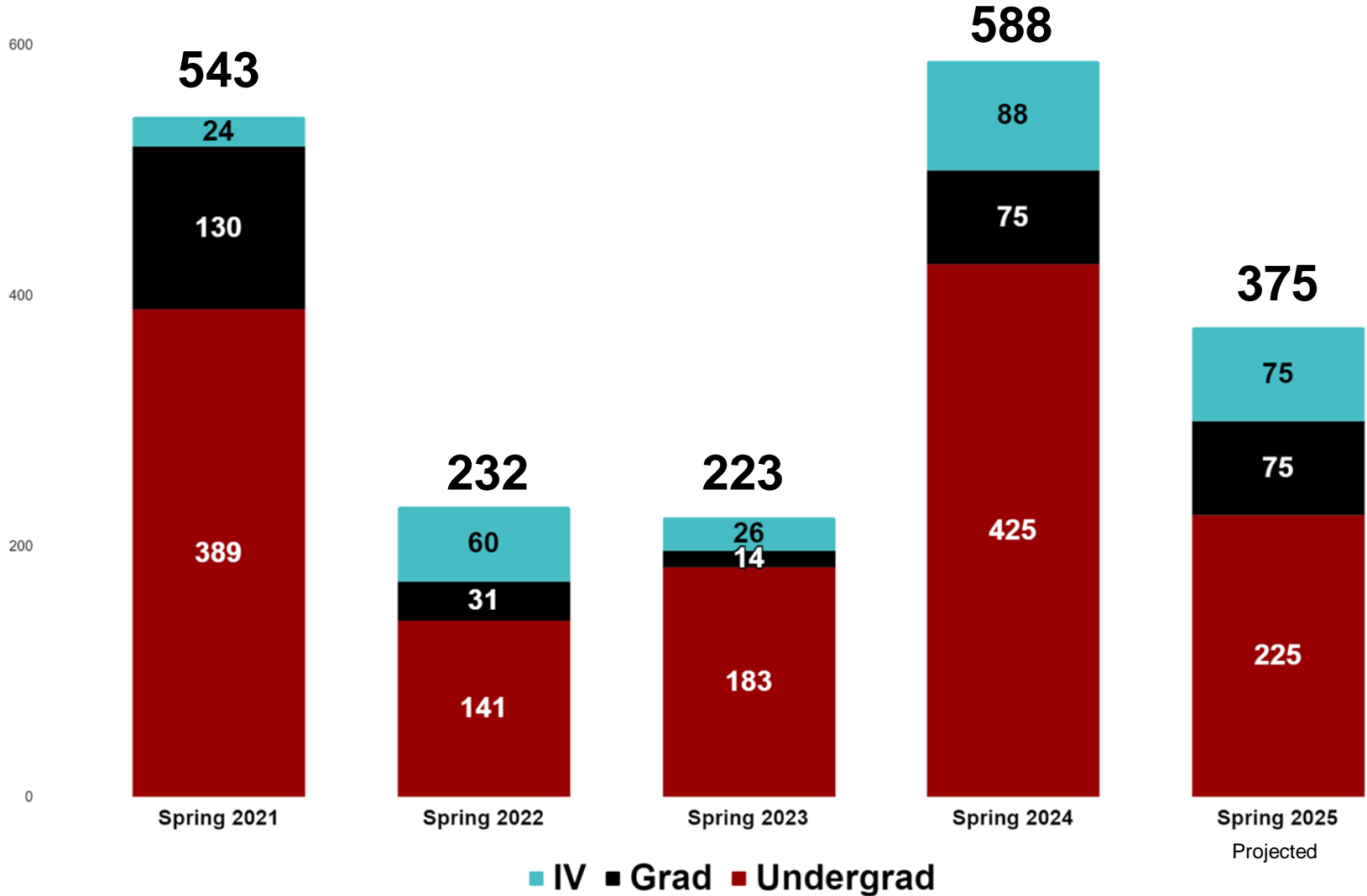
