Campus Fee Advisory Committee (CFAC) Report: "Student Referendum on Proposal to Expand SDSU Student Success Fee to SDSU Imperial Valley"

There is currently a proposal to expand the SDSU Student Success Fee to SDSU Imperial Valley. We are currently in the information sharing period leading up to a student fee referendum. The actual **student vote** will take place **November 28-29.**

Background

- In 2014 the Student Success Fee was approved to be used 90% for faculty and 10% for academic related programs (student-led programming).
- The fee was approved to be charged to students at SDSU in San Diego, but not SDSU Imperial Valley.
- Since the fee was implemented, it has funded 82 additional faculty members, and \$9M in Academic Related Programming, but since IV students weren't paying they fee, they didn't have access to the same benefits afforded by this fee.
- The referendum would extend the fee and its associated benefits to students at SDSU Imperial Valley.
- A yes or no result will not impact the fee students pay at San Diego, it will ONLY impact the students at IMPERIAL VALLEY.
- Students will receive a link to vote in their email when the voting period begins.

Frequently Asked Questions:

• If the fee is only charged to students at Imperial Valley, why do all students need to vote?

The Chancellor's Office interpretation of the SDSU elections code is that ALL regularly enrolled SDSU students are eligible to vote in the election, regardless if they will be impacted by the fee

RE: ACTION ITEM- San Diego State University Senate Resolution To Increase

Number of Awarded Sabbatical Applications

WHEREAS: Article 27.10b of the Collective Bargaining Agreement states that a campus shall grant one semester at full pay sabbatical leaves (Type A) to *no fewer* than twelve percent (12%) of the total number of campus faculty unit employees eligible to apply for such leaves in that year (henceforth referred to as eligible faculty) and approves *all* sabbatical applications for two semesters at half pay (Type B), as well as, difference in pay (DIP) applications;

WHEREAS: Over the past 10 years, an average of 17% of eligible faculty applied for Type A and an average of 28% of these applications have been rejected annually because San Diego State University awards only 12.5% of eligible faculty Type A sabbatical applications, near the contract minimum;

WHEREAS: The reduction in pay resulting from the more accessible Type B or DIP leaves is more affordable to faculty with greater household wealth, resulting in equity issues between who can better afford these leaves and who cannot:

WHEREAS: San Diego State University does not provide publicly-available data on the financial cost of sabbaticals, sabbatical eligibility, application numbers, and award numbers by Type A, Type B, and DIP applications;

WHEREAS: Becoming a R1 Doctoral University is one of the five <u>SDSU strategic priorities</u> and the current rate of sabbatical application rejection is a significant departure from many similarly-sized comparable and aspirational R1 Doctoral Universities;

WHEREAS: Sabbatical provides opportunities to produce and expand research activities that are impeded by high teaching and service demands (e.g., exploration of new areas of research and mastering new techniques, development of new collaborations, synthesizing previous work, pursuing external funding)¹and facilitate new and improved academic activities (e.g., development of new student-centered programming, improved skills as an instructor, more knowledgeable of teaching methods and modalities, innovating ways to enhance organizational processes)²;

WHEREAS: Sabbatical respite results in improved psychological and emotional wellness and decreased stress and burnout for faculty³;

RESOLVED: That the San Diego State University Divisions of Academic Affairs and Student Affairs and Campus Diversity and the Office of the Provost will adhere to the values of transparency and shared governance by providing public annual reports containing the financial

investments in sabbaticals, data related to eligibility, application rates, and acceptance rates, and the rationale for any failure to fund all recommended applications, beginning with the application cycle for the 23-24 academic year.

RESOLVED: That the San Diego State University Senate demands that the Divisions of Academic Affairs and Student Affairs and Campus Diversity and the Office of the Provost break with past practice and meet the full demands for sabbaticals, rather than the contract minimum, beginning with application cycle for the 23-24 academic year.

RATIONALE:

For centuries, the sabbatical has been a beneficial and necessary aspect of academia, benefiting the psychological and emotional well-being of faculty, enhancing educational techniques and modalities, furthering research and understanding of our world, and supporting University processes. Sabbatical is an opportunity for faculty to focus intensively on their scholarly activities and/or professional growth. Perhaps at no greater time than this one, as we all continue to feel the impacts of the pandemic and other societal turmoil, University support is needed for faculty who have put their research and scholarly activities on the backburner to support student and University needs. The current practice of granting the contract minimum number of Type A sabbatical applications results in higher rejection rates and makes sabbatical more obtainable only to those that can afford to be paid less. The students and the University would stand to gain from more investment in this highly beneficial aspect of University life. Becoming an R1 Doctoral institution is an SDSU strategic priority, which necessarily entails attracting well-qualified scholars and researchers who will contribute substantial and innovative research. A recent survey of comparable and aspirational R1 Doctoral Institutions found many of these institutions funded nearly all sabbatical applications. While some of these institutions approved smaller percentages, SDSU's rate would rank near the bottom of this group, as could be determined from public-facing information. As SDSU seeks to become a R1 Doctoral University, it would be well-served to utilize greater sabbatical awards to increase research and scholarly activity growth, support faculty requests for grant funding, improve university programming, and attract well-qualified faculty.

Resolution of the San Diego State University Senate: Feedback on the Adoption of the California General Education Transfer Curriculum (Cal-GETC) to Succeed IGETC

WHEREAS: The San Diego State University Senate (SDSUS) confirm its strong, ongoing commitment to creating an accessible, welcoming transfer process for transfer students; and

WHEREAS: In accordance with the request from the Academic Senate of the California State University (ASCSU) to provide feedback on the adoption of the Intersegmental Council of Academic Senates (ICAS)¹ Cal-GETC proposal for a singular GE pattern as required by Assembly Bill 928² to streamline transfers to the CSU and UC; and

WHEREAS: The SDSUS understands the importance of Cal-GETC and the consequences of faculty not approving a transfer pathway; however SDSUS did not come to consensus about approving the adoption of the Cal-GETC proposal; and

WHEREAS: The SDSUS is seriously concerned about Cal-GETC's impact on general education, especially Area C and the humanities; and

WHEREAS: The SDSUS acknowledges the assurances from the Chancellor's Office that GE will be treated as a separate issue from AS-928 because it is not included in the legislation³; and

RESOLVED: That the SDSUS shall oppose any conflation of CSU GE changes or extension of the legal requirement beyond transfer students, because AB928 is silent on CSU first-time, first-year students (freshmen) and GE/campus GE (CSU GE), and be it further

RESOLVED: That this resolution be distributed to the ASCSU so that they can provide this feedback to ICAS, which will inform the final transfer curriculum; and be it further

Rationale

SDSUS Nonconsensus for Approval of Cal-GETC Proposal

On September 20, 2022, ASCSU Chair Steffel forwarded the request from ASCSU Resolution AS-3565-22/APEP "Feedback on the Intersegmental Committee of Academic Senates (ICAS) Cal-GETC Proposal" to senate chairs for each Campus Senate submit feedback to the ASCSU by October 24, 2022, that takes one of the following three positions regarding the ICAS Cal-GETC proposal (June 2022): a) Support the ICAS Cal-GETC proposal (June 2022), b) Recommend specific changes that satisfy the requirements of AB 928, with rationale, c) Unable to come to a consensus.

The SDSU Senate did not come to a consensus about the ICAS Cal-GETC Proposal in time to meet the October 24, 2022 deadline. The response rate for the survey was low and the Senate listserv reflected a great deal of consternation and confusion. The short turnaround time for the survey also made it necessary to discuss these outcomes at the full senate meeting on November 1, 2022.

Background

Assembly Bill 928 is a law that mandates a set of lower-division GE courses that gives community college students the option to transfer to either the UC or CSU. This law gave the Intersegmental Committee of Academic Senates (ICAS) the responsibility to develop and approve a single transfer pathway for transfer students by May 2023. It is important to note that if faculty fail to agree on a pathway, the law requires the CSU, UC, and community college systems' administrations to develop the pathway, removing the purview of the faculty from this important curricular decision.

During AY 2021-22, ICAS worked to develop the proposed Cal-GETC pathway. Cal-GETC was the best option that they could negotiate because of the constraints that were imposed by the AB-928 legislation. It is a subset of the current transfer curriculum and provides some of what our students need, but by no means fulfills all of the needs of our diverse students.


SDSU ICAS Cal-GETC Proposal Survey Results

The Senate Office emailed the SDSU ICAS Cal-GETC proposal survey on September 30, 2022 to the senate's 133-member listserv, with a response deadline of October 21, 2022. Reminders were emailed on October 12th and October 18th. Senators were reminded to solicit feedback from their colleges in response to the ASCSU request for

campus feedback about the ICAS Cal-GETC Proposal. The survey closed on Friday, October 21st at midnight. The response rate was 37% (n=36).

Forty-seven percent (47.3%, n=28) of the respondents indicated that they support the ICAS Cal-GETC Proposal; 25%, strongly disagreed or disagreed:

A. I support the ICAS Cal-GETC proposal (June 2022).



Themes from qualitative responses included the following concerns and suggestions:

- Serious concerns about the proposal's impacts on GE curriculum that compound the impact that EO 1100 course reductions had on the arts, languages, history, humanities and other areas that help students become well-rounded, good citizens⁴;
 - o I beg and plea that this change is not implemented it is a gargantuan and preventable mistake. If you are reading this, you have power to affect change. Don't sit on the sidelines. Do the right thing and fight to keep Arts & Humanities requirements, in full, a part of our education. The impacts of cutting Arts and Humanities requirements will be to generate ever more ethnocentrism, discrimination, implicit bias, lack of critical thinking, and a backsliding of democracy in the U.S. (which is already sliding fairly quickly).
- Requests to not make any additional cuts in the arts and humanities and instead make cuts in lifelong learning, self-development or other areas in the sciences;
 Concern that this legislation is eroding faculty purview over the curriculum;
 - I'm fine with cutting lifelong learning and self development, if 3 core units

need to be cut. In conclusion, I propose they cut 3 units in science, either from life or physical science and cut the 3 units from lifelong learning and self development, but DO NOT cut more units out of the already pared down humanities requirement.

- Impacts on liberal studies and other programs, undermining student's ability to move into majors that have a lot of units and requirements associated with the specific major;
 - I am concerned about the impact of this program on Liberal Studies, the CSET waiver program, and access to ITEP programs. This proposed change seems to remove the barriers that students face in transferring to a university. How does this support them in moving into a major like Liberal Studies which has a lot of units and requirements associated with the major?
- Reduction in units may ease the transfer process and help transfer students focus on other things like research, or participation in transfer student success seminars and support programs.
 - Standardization and simplication of the pathway from community college will be good for transfering to UC and CSU.

Conflation of CSU GE Changes or Extension of the Legal Requirement Beyond Transfer Students

In a March 8, 2022 webinar and in follow-up communications, staff from the Chancellor's Office expressed their desire to reduce and standardize CSU GE for all students, not just transfer students. However, an October 7, 2022 email from Executive Vice Chancellor Sylvia Alva to ASCSU Chair Beth Steffel affirmed that the law does not mandate changes to CSU GE and her strong commitment to shared governance⁵.

ACTION: The CBL Committee moves that the Senate adopt the following changes to the Senate policy file (Bylaws).

- 13.0 Availability of Documents and Records
- 13.1 All agendas, minutes, reports, other attachments, and action memos of all regular and special Senate and Senate Standing Committees shall be posted on the senate website.
- 13.2 Confidential material shall be redacted or omitted from posted materials, but the agenda item in which confidential material is addressed shall be included in the table of contents and minutes.
- 13.3 These posted documents shall be available to any member of the university community and other CSU senates and counsels upon request.
- 13.4 The policy file shall be linked on the senate website.
- 13.1.Senate documents shall be available in archive form. These archives may be stored electronically, rather than in paper form.
- 13.2 The agendas of Senate meetings shall be available to any member of the university community upon request. The agendas of the Senate Executive Committee shall likewise be available, but the attachments to the meetings of the Committee shall be available only to members of the Committee.
- 13.3 An electronic archive file of Senate and Senate appointed university committee reports and a file of Senate minutes shall be available on the Senate website for at least two years following the meeting.

Rationale:

Specifies that all Standing Committees need to submit minutes and agendas so they are open for all. Confidential items have to be mentioned in minutes and agenda however their exact content and the discussion about them is not part of posted documents. (e.g. SEC can just list in the agenda: "Naming Proposal"). The senate policy file calls for confidentiality at several places and human resources and state law also requires confidentiality. The secretary of the senate will investigate the possibility to list as footnote where in the policy file confidentiality is called for.

3.7 Committee on Constitution and Bylaws

3.7.1. Membership (7):

3.7.1.1. Ex officio (voting): The Committee shall eonsist of the Secretary of the Senate.

3.7.1.2. Appointed (6): four faculty members, and one non-MPP staff member nominated by the Committee on Committees and Elections and appointed selected by the Staff Affairs Committee in consultation with the staff senators and confirmed by the Senate, and one student appointed in accordance with procedures established by the Associated Students. At least two of the appointed members shall be senators.

3.7.2 The parliamentarian, while not a member of the committee, shall be invited to the meeting in an advisory capacity.

Rationale:

All other standing committees specify that some of their membership have to serve in the senate. We require 2 given the Secretary of the Senate is also a senator, so in practice (excluding the student member) 3 of the 6 committee members are senator. This is a higher ration than that of most other committees.

The parliamentarian is present at almost every meeting and often consulted in between. His advice is essential. We do not include the parliamentarian as member given this way it is easier to reach quorum. Not quorum for committees is more than half according to the policy file. So 4 for this committee.

Subject: ACTION: Minor Modifications to Existing Undergraduate Courses

The Academic Policy and Planning Committee (AP&P) moves that the Senate adopt the following changes to UNIVERSITY POLICIES: Academics, Curriculum Changes, Undergraduate and Graduate, Section 5.2, along with new language to be included in the Curriculum Guide.¹

Curriculum Changes, Undergraduate and Graduate

- 5.2 New Undergraduate Courses, and Changes in Existing Programs, and Major Modifications to Existing* Courses
 - 5.2.1 Curriculum proposals for new classes, major changes in existing classes, or programs shall be sent concurrently to the General Education (GE) Committee if changes involve the University's GE program and the Graduate Curriculum Sub-Committee (GCC) for undergraduate proposals that involve classes open to graduate students, for approval.
 - 5.2.2 Proposals approved by GE and/or GCC shall be sent to the Undergraduate Curriculum Committee (UCC). Proposals that do not require review by GE or GCC shall skip step 5.2.1 and go directly to UCC. Proposals for minor modifications to existing undergraduate courses can skip 5.2.2 and go directly to the Senate as information items.
 - 5.2.3 Proposals approved by the UCC shall be reported to the Senate, to the AA-AVPs, Academic Deans Council, Undergraduate Council, and Associated Students as information items.

*See Curriculum Guide for current list of course modifications requiring additional review and approval.

Proposed language to be included in the Curriculum Guide:

Curriculum Guide

¹ Note of clarification: These proposed changes build upon the revised curriculum approval process approved at the October 6, 2022 Senate meeting. For legibility, the text approved at that meeting appears in **BLUE** (since it is not yet reflected in our current University Policy File). The proposed revisions appear in **RED**.

Generally, the review path for undergraduate course modifications involving only the initiating college's curriculum will no longer include the Undergraduate Curriculum Committee. Proposals approved by the College Dean (or designee) will be sent simultaneously to the Senate Executive Committee, Undergraduate Curriculum Committee, and Undergraduate Council. Unless objections arise, curriculum proposals will then be included in the Senate report as an information item.

There will be situations where additional review is needed:

- Undergraduate Curriculum Committee will review if the course modification is major. For example, if it implicates other colleges, or switches the course from lower (100-200) to upper division (300-400), or from undergraduate (<500) to graduate (500 and above), or vice versa.
- Undergraduate Writing Committee will review if the change involves adding or modifying a "W" or "DW" designation to classes satisfying the Graduation Writing Assessment Requirement (GWAR).
- Student Learning/Community Engagement Committee will review if the change involves adding or modifying a Service Learning or Community Engagement designation.
- International Affairs University Senate Council will review if the change involves adding or modifying Global Learning designation.

Changes to the list of situations where additional review is needed can be made by approval of AP&P.

Rationale:

The Office of Curriculum, Assessment and Accreditation, in consultation with the Academic Deans, Associate Vice Presidents, and the Chairs and Directors, proposes these changes to the curriculum approval process to further streamline curricular review and address the perpetual backlog of proposals. Every year, there are a significant number of curriculum proposals that do not advance through the entire curriculum cycle. This problem persisted when we used a paper process and later CurricuNet. The problem continues with the adoption of Curriculog. Although Curriculog is more intuitive and allows us to produce a catalog much quicker, incomplete proposals (i.e. proposals still under review) are purged from the system when Curriculog closes for catalog updates, a problem for which there is no technical workaround.

The annual large backlog of proposals is due, in part, to requiring every course modification to undergraduate classes to go through full review. However, around 60% of all undergraduate course modification proposals feature only minor modifications, such as updating contact hours, instruction mode(s), grading basis, repeat for credit rules, or course note(s). These proposals are nonetheless required to go through full review. While the University Curriculum Committee (UCC) meets weekly, there are too many proposals for them to review and approve. Although Curriculum Services reentered the 145 leftover proposals from the 2021-2022 academic year, they cannot continue to do so. Moving forward, the proposal originator will need to re-enter all incomplete proposals in the Spring semester. While re-entered proposals will begin the next

cycle at the approval stage from the prior year, reentering proposals is nevertheless an unfortunate additional step in the curriculum process.

To date, there are approximately 510 proposals in the system, about 400 of which are undergraduate proposals. Roughly 60% of those proposals involve minor modifications (approximately 240).

This proposal would help chip away at a significant portion of the curriculum backlog by offering an abbreviated review. Depending on the type of modification, the College Dean or appropriate curriculum committee (GE, Writing, Service Learning, Global Learning) would approve, and then the item would be included on a report that would move to the Senate Executive Committee and then on to the Senate as an information item. The University Undergraduate Curriculum Committee would receive the report at the same time as SEC, thus allowing the UCC three weeks before the Senate meeting to lodge any concerns. In addition, course modifications included as information items in the Senate consent calendar may be moved out of the information item for further consideration at the request of a Senator.

Examples of minor modifications include:

- Updating course title OR course description that does not impact other colleges and that reflects only minor changes in content.
- Changing catalog numbers without changing from lower division (100-200) to upper division (300-400), undergraduate (<500) to graduate (500 or above), or vice versa. (The old catalog number must be retired and cannot be used again for five years.)
- Converting existing undergraduate courses that involve no other curriculum changes to GE courses, pending GE Committee's approval (these courses can skip UCC review)
- Updating unit range for variable unit courses.
- Updating Contact Hours
- Updating Instruction Mode(s)
- Updating Grading Basis
- Updating Repeat for Credit Rules
- Updating Course Note(s)
- Updating current and/or deleting enrollment requirements (i.e., prerequisites, corequisites, concurrent); addition of requirements outside of college requires that proof of consultation be attached to the proposal
- Updating Instructional Methods (CS codes)
- Updating Course/Department/College Specific Requirements
- Program changes that only reflect minor modifications to existing courses

Subject: Review of membership and electorate in light of update to bylaws 1. Allow contingent SSP-AR and librarians to serve. Discussion with staff affairs on how auxiliary employees were added in the current policy file language.

The CBL moves that the Senate adopt the following changes to Senate policy file (Constitution).

4.0 Membership and Electorate

4.1 Elected Members

4.1.1. Professors Faculty

4.1.1.1 Tenured and Probationary Faculty

- 4.1.1.1.1 The electorate shall consist of all tenured and probationary members of the faculty, as defined in Bylaws 1.1.1, representing each of the following constituencies: College of Arts and Letters, Fowler College of Business, College of Education, College of Engineering, College of Health and Human Services, College of Professional Studies and Fine Arts, College of Sciences, Imperial Valley Campus, Library, and Student Service Professionals Academically Related (SSP-AR).
- 4.1.1.1.2. Each of the constituencies outlined above shall elect the number of Senators equivalent to nine percent (9%), rounded up to the nearest integer, of its tenured and probationary full time equivalent faculty positions. This method of apportionment shall always yield at least one elected Senator for each constituency.
- 4.1.1.1 Tenured and Probationary Faculty Professors elected as members of the Senate shall be tenured and probationary faculty as defined in the Bylaws
- 4.1.1.2 Professor Senators shall be apportioned annually as follows: each major academic unit (as defined in the Bylaws) shall elect the number of

Senators equivalent to nine percent (9%), rounded up to the nearest integer, of the tenured/tenure track full time equivalent faculty positions (FTEF) assigned to that unit. This method of apportionment shall always yield at least one Senator for each major academic unit.

- 4.1.1.3 The term of office for Professor Senators shall be three Senate calendar years. A Professor Senator shall serve no more than two consecutive complete terms. Service for—a partial term and for terms served on the Academic Senate of The California State University shall not be included in this calculation. So far as feasible, Senate terms shall be arranged so that only one-third of the membership is elected annually in the spring.
- 4.114. Delegates from this university to the Academic Senate of The California State University shall be considered elected members of the Senate.
- . 4.115.The electorate shall consist of all tenured and probationary faculty, as defined in the Bylaws
 - 4.1.1.2. Lecturers. Contingent Faculty (10). There shall be ten elected Contingent Faculty Senators. At least eight of them shall be lecturers, with no more than two representing a single college or equivalent unit. No more than one shall be a Contingent Student Services Professionals-Academic Related (SSP-AR) faculty and no more than one shall be an assistant librarian. The electorate shall consist of all contingent faculty members as defined in Bylaws 1.1.2.

There shall be 8 elected lecturer senators, with no more than two representing a single College or SDSU Imperial Valley. The electorate shall consist of all lecturers.

- 4.1.32. Coaches (1). There shall be one elected coach senator. The electorate shall consist of all coaches.
- 4.1.3 Non-Management Personal Plan (MPP) Staff (6). There shall be six non-MPP staff senators elected from permanent non-MPP staff. One staff senator position shall be reserved for an SDSU Imperial Valley staff member. The electorate shall consist of permanent and temporary non-MPP staff, including probationary staff.
- 4.1.4 Non-Represented (2). There shall be two non-represented employees. Directors, Associate Directors, and students (represented ex-officio under Bylaws 1.5) are not eligible. The electorate shall consist of all eligible to run.

4.14 Staff (8)

- 4.1.4.1. There shall be six non Management Personnel Plan (MPP) staff senators elected from permanent non-MPP staff. One staff senator position shall be reserved for an SDSU Imperial Valley staff member. The electorate shall consist of permanent and temporary non-MPP staff, including probationary staff.
- 4.1.4.2. There shall be two non represented (Foundation, Aztec Shops, etc.) staff.
- 4.2 Terms. The term of office for all elected senators listed in 4.1 shall be three senate calendar years. A senator shall serve no more than two consecutive complete terms. Service for a partial term and for terms served on the Academic Senate of The California State University shall not be included in this calculation. So far as feasible, Senate terms shall be staggered so that no more than one-third of the membership is elected annually in the spring.
- 4.3 ASCSU Delegates. All delegates from SDSU to the Academic Senate of The California State University (ASCSU) shall be considered elected and voting members of the SDSU University Senate.
- 4.43-Ex officio Members. The Senate may include ex officio, voting or non-voting, representatives as members. The ex officio members of the Senate shall be designated in the Bylaws.
- 4.54 Vacancies. Vacancies in Senate membership shall be filled in a manner prescribed by the Bylaws.

Rationale:

This action item makes 2 substantial changes and cleans up language:

The substantial changes are

- 1) Two seats for contingent faculty are added. This makes seats available for contingent SSP-AR faculty and assistant librarians. Both groups are currently not able to serve. In 21-22 there were 32 contingent SSP-AR faculty on campus (of which 26 in Counseling and Psychological Services.
- 2) The section on non-MPP staff seats and auxiliary employee representation is reformulated at the request and in consultation with the Staff Affairs Committee. Most of these non-represented staff work for Auxiliaries. We do excludes students (part of Associated students) and managers.

Other changes clarify issues.

- "Tenured and Probationary Faculty" are no longer referred to as "Professors"
- The units that have "Tenured and Probationary Faculty" representation equivalent to 9% of their membership are listed here (instead of a referral to Bylaws)
- Language is aligned with that adopted by the Senate in Bylaws 1.0 May 2022, e.g. contingent faculty, coaching faculty
- It is clarified that ALL terms are 3 years not just those of "Tenured and Probationary Faculty".

Subject: Request to clarify the Senate and elected membership of the PBAC committee.

ACTION: The Chair of the PBAC Committee moves that the Senate adopt the following changes to the Senate policy file.

President's Budget Advisory Committee (PBAC)

- 1.0 Membership: The Vice President for Business and Financial Affairs (VP-BFA) co-chairs the committee with the Senior Vice President for Academic Affairs (Provost), which meets regularly at the call of the Chair. The VP-BFA and Provost set the membership of the committee based on the President's direction, and share that membership roster with the Senate officers and the Chair of the Committees for Committees and Elections.
 - 1.1. Voting members shall at a minimum include:
 - 1.1.1. Ex officio members (2): Senate Chair, or designee, and the Chair of the Senate Committee for University Resources and Planning (URP).
 - 1.1.2. Elected members (4): three elected tenured and probationary faculty members and one elected non-MPP staff member.
 - 1.2. Eligibility: The four elected representatives on PBAC shall be tenured and probationary faculty members or non-MPP staff. There shall be no more than one faculty representative from any of the following: College of Arts and Letters, College of Engineering, College of Professional Studies and Fine Arts, Fowler College of Business, College of Education, College of Health and Human Services, College of Sciences, SDSU Imperial Valley, and the Library. Three of the elected representatives shall be tenured and probationary faculty members, and one shall be a non-MPP staff member.
- 2.0 Procedure for Electing Senate Representatives to PBAC¹

Eligibility: The four elected representatives on PBAC shall be tenured and probationary faculty members or non-MPP staff. There shall be no more than one representative from any of the following: College of Arts and Letters, College of Engineering, College of Professional Studies and Fine Arts, Fowler College of Business, College of Education, College of Health and Human Services, College of Sciences, SDSU Imperial Valley, and the Library. Three of the elected representatives shall be tenured and probationary faculty members, and one shall be a non-MPP staff member.

- 2.1. Nominations and Elections:
 - 2.1.1. The Senate Committee on Committees and Elections Chair shall announce vacancies and make a call for nominations. The Staff Affairs Committee Chair shall announce vacancies and make a call

¹ Exceptional Procedure for Academic Year 2019-2020. All 2019-2020 interim appointments shall end at the conclusion of the academic year. The Chairs of the Senate and Staff Affairs Committee shall send out a call for nominations for all four vacancies no later than the second week of March 2020, and the election shall be held during the Senate/Staff Affairs Committee's April 2020 meeting. In order to stagger terms of the elected representatives, the length of terms beginning in the Fall of 2020 shall be determined by lot after the election. One of the elected representatives shall serve a one-year term, one shall serve a two-year term, and two shall serve three-year terms. Subsequently all terms shall be three years.

- for nominations to all non-MPP staff.
- 2.1.2. Calls for nominations shall go out no later than the second week of February for terms that begin the following academic year.
- 2.1.3. The call for nominations shall include the following statement: "For these positions, it is desirable for nominees to have experience with and understanding of complex budgets. Elected representatives are expected to make decisions based on the overall academic mission of the university, and not to advocate for their respective academic or bargaining units."
- 2.1.4. Nominations shall be made by a tenured and probationary faculty member or non-MPP staff member with the approval of the nominee. No self-nominations are allowed.
- 2.1.5. Nominees shall write a short statement, no longer than 250 words, addressing their qualifications for the position. The statement shall be distributed to the Senate in advance and summarized on the Senate floor on the day of the election.

2.1.6. Elections:

- 2.1.6.1. Faculty representatives shall be elected by the full Senate in an election managed by the Committee on Committees and Elections, per the procedures outlined in the Bylaws, no later than the end of March for terms that begin the following academic year.
- 2.1.6.2. The staff representative shall be elected by the or Staff Affairs Committee no later than the end of March for terms that begin the following academic year.

2.2. Terms

- 2.2.1. The election shall be for a three-year term, except for terms that begin in the Fall of 2020.
- 2.2.2. Elected representatives who go on leave for any part of the academic year forfeit the remainder of their term, creating a vacancy that shall be filled by regular procedure.
- 2.2.3. Upon the completion of their term, representatives may run for re-election but shall serve no more than nine consecutive years.

2.3. Exceptional Procedure for Academic Year 2019-2020

- 2.3.1. All 2019-2020 interim appointments shall end at the conclusion of the academic year.
- 2.3.2. The Chairs of the Senate and Staff Affairs Committee shall send out a eall for nominations for all four vacancies no later than the second week of March 2020, and the election shall be held during the Senate/Staff Affairs Committee's April 2020 meeting.
- 2.3.3. In order to stagger terms of the elected representatives, the length of terms beginning in the Fall of 2020 shall be determined by lot after the election. One of the elected representatives shall serve a one-year term, one shall serve a two-year term, and two shall serve three-year terms. Subsequently all terms shall be three years.
- **3.0** Function: The President's Budget Advisory Committee (PBAC) reviews the university budget periodically and makes recommendations to the President regarding budget proposals.

Rationale: Working with Senate Officers, the PBAC Committee agrees that the lack of clarity in the elected membership of the PBAC Committee has caused confusion. This action and update of the Policy File will ensure the membership in practice matches the policy file, which will in turn ensure confusion about who sits on the committee and how they are appointed remains clear to all as it will be outlined in

the policy file.

Subject: INFORMATION: Math readiness and precarity / Math equity gaps

The Academic Policy and Planning Committee (AP&P) annually reviews, discusses, and reports on enrollment, retention, and graduation data and enrollment management policies and outcomes. In partial fulfillment of this responsibility, we welcomed Sarah Axford, Math Equity Initiative Coordinator in Faculty Advancement and Student Success, to present her efforts to address equity gaps in undergraduate math readiness and precarity.

With funding from a small CSU grant, Ms. Axford has been studying equity gaps for science and engineering students who enter college at the pre-calculus level. Math readiness is a key indicator of non-retention for STEM students. Thirty percent of first-time frosh (FTF) science and engineering students enter at the college algebra or pre-calculus level, which delays their ability to fulfill major math requirements (there are some exceptions, such as Biology, where the impact might be less severe). Preliminary analyses suggest these math delays do not simply result in students taking longer to graduate. These students are in a more precarious situation, whether due to the accumulation of course repeats or risky enrollment patterns.

This project focused on data analysis of 610 pre-STEM, Pell recipient, Compact STEM students. Half were not yet on their major map because they were not "math ready." Rather than start with Calculus, these students enrolled in M 140/M 141. Many articulated feeling behind at the beginning of their college careers as a result. It is unclear to what extent students may feel detached from their major because of math barriers.

This project focused on studying specific interventions that might improve retention for math precarious students, including enrolling in M141A, an optional one-unit for-credit support course based on supplemental instruction, and participating in optional summer <u>ALEKS</u> (an online learning program that offers course products for Math, Chemistry, Statistics, etc.). While only a small number of students pursued these options, the interventions proved useful.

There are many implications that can be drawn from the data, including enhancing communication between students and admissions, expanding summer interventions, and ensuring greater availability of tutoring and supplemental instruction. Ms. Axford presented some emerging interventions, including:

- @HS Impact 12th grade course choice, Increase use of ALEKS, on-site efforts
- @Summer Asynchronous, instructor-led study sequence. Include in-person opportunities, pre-scheduled testing days. Increase students' feeling of readiness
- @Summer Funded M141 Summer Institute
- @1st year Increase pathway advising, academic supports
- @1st year Leverage existing 1st year courses as points for intervention (gateway not gatekeeper)
- @1st/2nd year Build STEM community w/ academic, entry-level programming

AP&P discussed the importance of summer course interventions before FTF enter in the fall, noting that math sequencing holds differential impacts on different majors. While it is clear that the best interventions are made at the high school level, it would be challenging to scale up to reach all local high schools to communicate the generally more positive outcomes for students who take calculus, or even pre-calculus, prior to entering SDSU. AP&P would like to see this work continue in sustainable and scalable ways, such that we can continue making meaningful incremental interventions to improve equity gaps for our at-risk STEM students.

Why are we focusing on math precarity?

- The largest first-year non-retention rates and six-year graduation equity gaps in the university are First Gen / Pell / URM STEM majors, especially in Engineering.¹
- Across these populations, DFWs in introductory Math and Stats courses are key early indicators of increased likelihood of non-retention or delayed graduation.¹
- Studies by our math faculty show that students who struggle early in Math 140 141 generally do not "catch up" via a standard course sequence.¹
 - o Research in the math department tracking success in calculus emphasizes the rate of "real success" in M141 and uses B- or better as the measure of mastery.²
 - o Students entering Calculus from M141 have lower success rates than students placing with ALEKS.²
 - o Students who enter at M141 have a 17% rate of completing calculus II.³



Revisions in the pre- and calculus sequence began 2015. Current use of ALEKS and data collection are part of this ongoing work.





Subject: ASCSU SENATE REPRESENTATION

The following items are referred to CBL and DEI from Senate Officers for review and deliberation. Please review Section 4.5 and other relevant sections of the SDSU University Senate Bylaws. Review the purpose and function of the ASCSU, the historical diversity of SDSU ASCSU senators, and SDSU DEI values. Make recommendations regarding inclusive election policies and criteria.

CBL and DEI seek input from SEC on the choice between the red and blue text below under 4.5. The difference is between "lecturer" or "contingent faculty". The latter includes contingent SSP-AR members and Assistant Librarians.

Although we realize that chances that an contingent SSP-AR member or Assistant Librarian will run for an ASCSU seat are slim, we of course nevertheless want to formulate this correctly.

The text in red (lecturers only) is motivated by remarks of current and past ASCSU senators that ASCSU business deals mainly with academic issues. Then others claim that it is more inclusive to at least allow other contingent faculty to run (text in blue). Moreover TT SSP-AR faculty is allowed to serve under current policy.

Rather than calling a separate meeting with ASCSU senators and other stakeholders, we seek hereby advise from SEC. Two ASCSU senators serve on SEC and the third (Csomay) usually attends as guest. Other SEC members might have valuable insight.

In addition we plan to propose a rule for when an ASCSU seat becomes vacant midyear (like now due to Ornatowski's retirement). 4.5.6. Any feedback on that is welcome as well but not necessary.

4.5.6 In the case of a vacancy in the middle of a three-year term, an election shall be conducted as soon as practicable. The elected ASCSU senator shall be appointed by the Senate as a substitute for the remainder of the AY and start serving their own full term on June 15

Once we receive your input we hope to bring this back as an action item for the Nov SEC meeting.

4.5. Elections to the Academic Senate of The California State University

- 4.5.1. The Committee on Committees and Elections (CCE) shall devise procedures for and shall supervise and administer all elections of representatives from San Diego State University to the Academic Senate of The California State University (CSU Academic Senate) (ASCSU). Elections shall be held each Spring by May 1 for an ASCSU senator to start the upcoming AY.
- 4.5.2. Only tenured and probationary faculty members, as defined in Section 1.2 of these Bylaws, are eligible for election to the Academic Senate.

The following are eligible for election to the ASCSU.

- 4.5.2.1 "Tenured and Probationary" faculty members.
- 4.5.2.2 Lecturers on a multi-year contract.
- 4.5.3 At any point in time, not more than one of the ASCSU senators may be a lecturer. When one of the continuing ASCSU senators is a lecturer, only "Tenured and Probationary" faculty are eligible for election that year.

Alternative:

- 4.5.2. The following are eligible for election to the ASCSU.
 - 4.5.2.1 "Tenured and Probationary" faculty members.
 - 4.5.2.2 "Contingent faculty" on a multi-year contract.
- 4.5.3 At any point in time, not more than one of the ASCSU senators may be a contingent faculty member. When one of the continuing ASCSU senators is a lecturer, only "Tenured and Probationary" faculty are eligible for election that year.

ASCSU Policy

The ASCSU represents the faculty on the campus, including lecturers. The number of ASCSU senators from each campus is based on FTEF. The ASCSU constitution states that all members of the "faculty" are eligible to vote. According to Eadie at this moment "SDSU could be considered out of compliance to ASCSU requirements by allowing only tenured and probationary faculty to vote, should our current procedure ever be challenged".

As to who is allowed to **serve** as delegate to the ASCSU, all those defined as "faculty" are allowed to serve. Each campus shall determine which members of the campus

community are considered to be faculty. The faculty of the campus may, at its discretion, establish additional requirements for service as a campus representative.

- Minimally Modified Courses proposal (AVP Madhavi McCall). Council members generally in support but holding vote until full text of AP&P approved versions available for review. (Update: Effective 10/10, the Council has the text and will vote electronically.)
- Transportation Initiative: Council reviewed recent governmental <u>report</u> co-sponsored by SDSU that is attentive to the needs of commuter students. Hyman: any potential for Chula Vista campus to include transit options?

Council also reviewed two new items:

- <u>Initial analysis</u> of Fall 21 FTF retention (Joanna Brooks and Erin Jacobs), with additional review of report provided by Asst. Dean Preciado: https://collegecampaign.org/portfolio/higher-education-california-introduction-states-public-colleges-universities/
- Proposed modification of Policy File religious observance language (Jessica Nare, AVP, SACD)

BACKGROUND: Students report that the current requirement to notify faculty by the second week of classes about a religious observance is a barrier to receiving accommodations. California Ed Code supersedes individual campus policies and does not require students to request a religious accommodation by the second week of classes. This proposal seeks to remove the requirement that students request accommodations for religious accommodations by the second week of classes from the senate policy file.

PROPOSED CHANGE: 3.1. By the end of the second week of classes, Students should notify the instructors of affected courses of planned absences for religious observances.
